

FUTURE FARMERS OPEN FIRST STATE CONVENTION

SILVERTON HAS 125 DELEGATES AT CONCLAVE

Silverton—The first annual convention of the Oregon Future Farmers opened this morning with around 125 graduates of the Smith-Hughes courses in the senior high schools of the state attending. The conference lasts through Saturday. The forenoon session was held in the Eugene Field auditorium from 10:15 to 12 o'clock with the speakers, Earl R. Cooley of Salem, state supervisor of agricultural education, talking on "Young Farmers Organizations in Other States," and Kenneth Pettibone of Corvallis, state alumni F.F.A. president, giving a review of the Oregon alumni Future Farmer organization. Tom Miller of Silverton served as secretary.

Following the luncheon hour O. D. Adams, state director of vocational agriculture, will be the program speaker, and Raymond Kooch, state F. F. A. president, will tell of the progress of the Oregon Future Farmers' association. Talks will be made by staff members of the state department of agriculture.

R. E. Dimick, professor of fish and game management of the Oregon State college, will be the guest speaker at the 6:30 o'clock banquet this evening at the First Christian church. This is known as the annual "Feed-Lo-Lally." A "Major Bowes" Penrose program will be featured. Following the early evening program the group will attend the "Three Musketeers" movie program at the Palace theater.

Tom Miller, newly elected president of the local Alumni F. F. A. chapter, is official host to the visitors.

Alfred Adams, proprietor of the Palace theater, is extending the hospitality of the theater auditorium to the delegates for the Saturday forenoon program, beginning at 8:30 o'clock. Ray W. Gill, master of the Oregon state grange, is speaker. Talks will be given by a representative of the Farmers' Union, and election of officers will complete the forenoon session.

The convention members will be guests of the Silverton Hills Community club and grange at the hall for noon luncheon when O. R. Chambers of the Oregon State college will be the speaker. The public speaking contest will be the entertainment feature of the afternoon program which will close the session.

Woodburn is Minus Police Through Day

Woodburn—By a vote of 3 to 1 the Woodburn city council Tuesday night voted to over-ride the veto of Mayor S. A. Hoefler of the ordinance recently passed relating to the appointment of a day marshal, which leaves the city just where it has been for several months, without police protection in the day time.

The ordinance as passed gives the mayor his choice of either appointing John Muir, street commissioner, as day marshal without additional salary, or to leave the city without a day man. Hoefler stated that he would take the second course. Councilman Austin cast the dissenting vote against the measure.

This controversy arose some months ago when Muir, acting as day marshal in addition to his duties as street commissioner, was reported as having refused to take orders from the mayor who, by the provisions of the charter, is head of the police department, with the authority to appoint all police officers.
