NO PROFIT SALE WILL BE STAGED MT. ANGEL FOLK

Mt. Angel—Mt. Angel will hold its first cooperative auction sale Wednesday starting at 10 o'clock with the livestock starting promptly at 1 o'clock. The sale will be held at the Schmaltz warehouse.
