

NEW LIBRARY IS UNDER WAY UPON CAMPUS

McMinnville—Ground was broken this week for the construction of the new library building for Linfield college. The building is to be of reinforced concrete and pressed brick construction, 78x108 feet, of an architectural style harmonizing with the other college buildings, and is to be located just west of Melrose hall.

The building, costing about \$65,000, is a PWA project, financed partly by federal money and in part by a bond issue by the city of McMinnville, the bonds to be retired by funds obtained from student library fees. Residents of McMinnville are to be allowed to use the library under the same terms as the students of Linfield college.

The Charles W. Eitz Co., of Portland, has the contract. Labor is being secured so far as possible from local unemployed rolls.

McMinnville—A highway department crew is engaged in setting concrete in place of the open drainage ditch along the Pacific highway between the bridge over Coosine creek and the entrance to the Linfield college campus. The high crowned pavement with narrow shoulders has made this point hazardous to pedestrian traffic.
