

RESERVE OFFICERS OF STATE TO MEET IN SPRING

CORVALLIS TO BE CAMP SITE MILITARY MEN

Corvallis—Announcement was made Friday by Colonel Carl Abrams of the 382d Infantry that Corvallis is to be the location for the first reserve officers' camp ever to be held in Oregon. February 29 to March 1 was named the period during which the camp will be held.

From western and southern Oregon, 200 officers will come to this city for the history making camp, expected to be the first of an annual series, Colonel Abrams said. All branches of the service are invited to attend.

A tactical ride, with every man at the camp mounted in a cavalry attack problem, will be the feature of the camp. Captain Ben Nichols of Oregon State college staff will plan the battle problem which will last nearly all day Sunday, March 1.

The camp will open at noon on February 29 with special classes conducted by regular army men. A competitive pistol match between Oregon city will be conducted by Lieutenant Kenneth Dalton, Salem, state marksmanship officer. A banquet will be held that night.

Each officer attending the camp will pay his own expenses.
