

TOWNSEND CONGRESSIONAL CONVENTION CALLED

FIRST DISTRICT MEMBERS MEET EUGENE FEB. 12

Monmouth — A. Moore, district organizer, announces that Charles E. Hansen, state area manager, in conformity with the National organization plan of the Townsend movement issues a call for a Townsend congressional district convention in the first district to be held in Eugene on Wednesday, February 12 at 10 o'clock. All chartered clubs are entitled to one vote in the convention and one additional vote for each 500 persons.

Credentialed blanks may be obtained from state headquarters at 311 Dekum Bldg. All members of Townsend clubs are eligible to attend the convention and are requested to be seated together in the convention. The object of this convention is to elect seven Townsend club members to serve for six months as a congressional district board, whose business shall be to cooperate with the district organizer, who is ex-officio chairman of this board.

CORVALLIS HAS HIGH STANDARD FOR ITS MILK

Corvallis — Corvallis dairies maintained their former high standard of quality in market-milk production during the calendar year of 1935, stated Dr. G. V. Copson, city milk inspector, in an annual report on Corvallis milk conditions. Frequent inspections and surprise tests throughout the year showed bacterial counts for the various dairies to be exceedingly low and the butterfat contents to be uniformly high.

A careful check on dairies before issuance of market-milk license and conscientious, well trained, cooperative work by licensed Corvallis dairymen resulted in the production of what may be considered "perfect milk" for the Corvallis and college community, stated Dr. Copson. Of the 13 licensed dairymen selling milk in Corvallis all have several years experience with the exception of one. This, according to Dr. Copson, makes for the production of uniformly high quality milk for this community.

MILL CITY FACING PROBLEM OF SOILS

Albany — County Agent Floyd Mullen was in Mill City Wednesday along the North Santiam river valley, having been called there to investigate a problem that has arisen because of soil exhaustion and inability of owners to finance renewal through application of commercial fertilizers.

The county agent found that much of the land in that district has been farmed for many years without replacement of nutritive materials, and has now reached the marginal point, beyond which it can no longer be farmed at a profit. He found also, however, that available stock range is good and expressed hope Wednesday that a rehabilitation program can be worked out whereby farmers can make use of this range while restoring their tillable land to production.

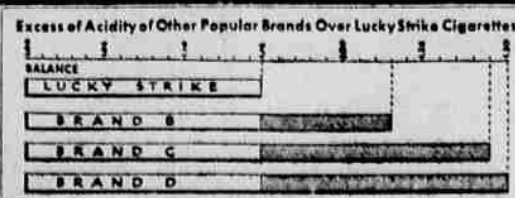
