FALLING TREE INJURES YOUTH

Independence—Leonard Banks, 16, son of Mrs. Cora Banks, of Independence, is in the hospital in Salem as the result of a very narrow escape from instant death while working in the timber with his brother, Robert, on the Smith place near Peder.

A large fir tree, about 100 feet high, which they were felling, kicked on the stump and in the kickback caught young Banks and knocked him to the ground, then rebounded several feet and landed again, this time missing the youth by a few feet as he dragged himself out of its path, sending the danger. The first impact fractured both jaw bones, cracked the collarbone and caused a compound fracture of one arm.

He was rushed to Independence for first aid, where Drs. Herley and Frutke gave him emergency treatment, and then was taken to Salem. Banks was cutting wood with his brother, about 20, when the accident occurred and the boy walked several rods to a nearby shack from which place he was taken on a stretcher to the highway and awaited an automobile to remove him to Independence.

INCREASE USE VALLEY LANDS EXPERT URGES

Corvallis—Increased use of flat valley lands and river bottom soil was advocated Friday morning by A. S. Burrier, land planning consultant of the Oregon free settlement administration, speaking to the Benton county agricultural economic conference.

Speaking generally on the topic of land utilization, Burrier touched upon the income derived from the timber land in the country. He urged that a policy of sustained yield be adopted, and estimated that at the present rate of cut, the forest land in the country would be completely depleted in about 20 years.

"There is enough valley and river bottom land in this country to take the poorer hill farms out of production and leave them for other purposes," said Burrier. He mentioned the fact that land planted to crops in the country had increased in the past 30 years but some of the most desirable and highest producing land is still not being used.

The speaker touched briefly on the farm debt situation declaring that various adjustment agencies have brought the farm debts somewhat more in line with prices. In summing up the situation, Burrier brought three points which have the greatest effect on the agricultural situation—national and international political situations; local climatic conditions; and methods of utilization of farm lands.

The conference was concluded Friday afternoon when the various committees appointed to study the problems of different phases of agriculture in the county submitted their reports to the conference.

LINFIELD COLLEGE PREXY WILL SPEAK

Independence—Dr. Eiam J. Anderson, president of Linfield college of McMinnville, will be a guest speaker at the Presbyterian church Tuesday evening, before the chamber of commerce.
