

M'NARY LETTER NOT APPROVED BY DELEGATES

Eugene, Feb. 13 (AP)—Evading a definite stand on the Townsend plan, Oregon's Senator Charles L. McNary drew strong disapproval from 700 Townsendites gathered here for the first congressional district convention yesterday.

In reply to the question "What is your stand on the Townsend plan?" McNary replied that he favored a better law than the present one and would support "any suitable plan that can be enacted into legislation." His letter pointed out that he did not know in what form the plan would reach the senate as it must originate in the house.

Townsend leaders have declared that if Senator McNary refused to take a definite stand in favor of the plan, they would "sacrifice" him in favor of a Townsendite. They indicated a candidate would be put into the field to seek his position in the senate if he failed to support the movement.

No plan of action has been announced, however, as no official endorsement can be made till the new advisory board is selected. This was to be done late today. The board must pass on all candidates before they can receive Townsend support. The state board and finally the national board must then pass on the candidates.

HOBSON STRESSES FAST BREAK PLAY

U. of O., Eugene, Feb. 13 (AP)—Oregon's big varsity hoopers will attempt to ease themselves out of the slough which has resulted from five straight defeats as they enter the second and final half of the northern division conference game against Washington State today Monday and Tuesday nights here on McArthur court. Both games will start at 7:30 o'clock.

The Websters, after a successful start, have lost five straight games, four to Washington and one to Oregon State, to drop down to fourth place in the circuit standings. The Cougars are half a game ahead of Oregon in third spot.

Work on the fundamentals of their fast break style of play, rather than any changes in the lineup, will be Hobson's strategy for this week's training program. Greater speed and more accurate ball handling will be stressed in the sessions.

Cliff (Chief) McLean, brilliant Indian ball-hawker who turned in an outstanding performance against Oregon State last Saturday night, appears to have clinched a guard berth on the starting quintet. He will probably replace the veteran Sam Liebowitz. Other starters for the Cougar series are expected to include Dave Silver and either Willie or Bud Jones, forwards. Chuck Patterson, center, and either Bill Courtney or Roland Bourke at the remaining guard berth.

Roosevelt Assailed In Portland Address By Herbert Hoover

Portland, Ore., Feb. 13 (AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover's possible role in the coming political campaign remained in doubt today, but the issue on which he hopes the republican party will wage a victorious campaign for leadership stood out sharply in the new deal.

The former president, in a vigorous and scathing attack on the present administration last night, strongly assailed President Roosevelt's recent address, charged waste and extravagance, declared the budget to be the worst unbalanced in history and apparently set at rest reports that proposals to alter the constitution might provide conflicting planks in the opposing major parties.

The declaration that "a balanced budget and a stable currency would put more men to work than the whole WPA" brought prolonged applause from the 1,000 guests at the Lincoln day banquet at which Hoover was the principal speaker. Many of his verbal barbs provoked laughter.

"The president stated a month ago that the issue before us is the 'right of the average man or woman to lead a finer, better, and happier life,' the former executive declared.

"That is an objective to which we all agree. That is the ideal of Americans since it was first mentioned in the Declaration of Independence. That is not the issue. The issue is the new deal methods and objectives which are destroying this very thing."

In referring to the Constitution, Hoover said:

"No progressive mind will feel that the Constitution shall not be changed to meet the needs of a changing national life."

In enlarging on his topic, "the confused state of the union," the titular head of the republican party charged that "the outstanding state of the union at this hour is a state of confusion. Confusion in thought, confusion in government, confusion in economic life and confusion in ideals. Few national problems have been solved."

Referring again to President Roosevelt's address, Hoover said:

"He (the president) says the only thing we have to fear is fear. Just so. It was the supreme court decisions crashing through new deal tyrannies which brought a gleam of confidence from the fears that had retarded recovery. The guiding spirit of the alphabet has not been love. It has been fear."

The former president particularly emphasized his opposition to inflation, declaring:

"The explosive forces of inflation are already being generated. For American people have a right to know and to know now what steps the president proposes to clean up this budget and money confusion. Unless this confusion can be quickly dissolved it will lead to one of the greatest tragedies of all humanity—inflation."

Hoover divided his talk into discussions of confusion, including fear, greed, dictatorship with democracy, economic life, fiscal and monetary policies, relief, recovery administration, authorities and constitution. He said there was no confusion in new deal politics.

Commenting on the relief program he declared:

"Under that guise (relief) great sociological experiments have been undertaken. It has impaired self-reliance and morals both in individuals and local government. The poison of politics is mixed in the bread of the helpless."

Hoover said "We have started on the road to recovery. But it is a confused recovery. We still have 20,000,000 people on relief after three years."

NEW CAPITOL CONTRACT WITH PWA EXECUTED

Portland, Feb. 13 (AP)—Members of the Oregon capital construction commission yesterday ratified a proposal creating a three-man executive committee. They also heard a suggestion that part of Willson park in Salem be decided by the city to the state or to the capital commission so as to enlarge the site for the new statehouse.

Creation of an executive committee was discussed at the previous meeting of the commission, but was not authorized. Yesterday, however, J. A. McLean, engineer, commission member, announced the appointment of an executive board.

This met with opposition from Robert W. Sawyer of Bend, and George A. Marshall of Baker. After a prolonged discussion the commission finally approved the general suggestion that an executive committee be appointed, and that a conference be arranged to outline its duties and restrictions.

Sawyer and Marshall objected again when Dr. E. C. Dalton suggested that only the chairman and members of the executive committee give interviews to the press. Otherwise they would not be muzzled. The question was dropped.

The subject of deciding part or all of Willson park to the state for added capitol grounds developed into a long discussion. It was explained that the state could accept the gift but that the state had no money to care for a yearly item of about \$2,000 for maintenance.

Dr. H. H. Olinger, committee member from Salem, then suggested that the city deed 250 feet of the east end of the park to the state of commission, and that there would be no maintenance charge against that section, consisting of trees, shrubs and lawn.

Just before adjournment the commission ratified and signed a new contract, based on the project cost of \$2,500,000 for the capitol, and notified the PWA authorities in Washington of the action.

CASH INCOME HIGHER IN 1935

Cash income from the sale of farm products, including rental and benefit payments, in 1935 was 5 per cent higher than in 1934 and 60 per cent higher than 1932, the low point of the depression, department of agriculture statisticians have estimated.

Estimated cash income in 1935 was \$6,532,000,000 compared with \$6,337,000,000 the previous year. The 1932 figure was \$4,328,000,000. Income for each month in 1935 was higher than that of the corresponding month in 1934 with the exception of July. The greatest increase, however, in 1935, was in the last three months of the year.

The cause of this last-quarter spurt in farm income, according to the department's experts' estimates, was partly the increased marketings from the larger crop production of 1935, but was also the increased demand for farm products and the usually heavy marketings of meat animals.

The month of December showed a slight decline over November with \$598,000,000 cash income, compared with \$609,000,000. However, December was considerably better than the same month in 1934, for which a cash income of \$473,000,000 was estimated.
