

PARTY TICKETS ALL FILLED BY LINN POLITICOS

Albany—Expiration of the time allowed for filing of candidacies for nominations in the republican and democratic primaries of May 13 found every office in Linn county and in the legislative district with at least one aspirant on each party ticket.

Last minute filings Monday included those of Mrs. Viola Paller, Lebanon, for the office of county school superintendent; Pierce Jenks, Tangent, for the office of county clerk of the democratic ticket; George Billings, Lebanon, for the republican ticket for the office of sheriff and Victor Oliver, republican, seeking re-nomination for the office of justice of the peace in district No. 1.

Eighteen republicans had filed and 16 democrats filling for the nominations and with three filings for the non-partisan office of circuit judge, it brought the total to 37. L. H. McMahon, acting judge of circuit court, district No. 3, filed for the nomination as did Walter E. Keyes and W. H. Trindle, all of Salem.

TRIALS IN PROGRESS

Albany—Trial of the personal injury case of Richard Goerling vs. J. H. Beck was believed to be nearing its conclusion and will be considered by a circuit court grand jury Wednesday, clearing the way for the re-trial of the State of Oregon vs. James J. Cronin, which was scheduled to open April 1. Cronin is accused of assaulting Claude Huiz with intent to kill.

The damage case now in trial involves an automobile collision on the Pacific highway near the Calapooia bridge north of Shedd last winter, in which Goerling alleges he was injured. He asks damages totaling \$20,375.

TEACHERS GET SALARY RAISE AT CORVALLIS

Corvallis—Corvallis school teachers will receive an increase in salaries for the next school year, the city school board decided Monday night after a meeting with the citizens' budget committee.

Complete details as to the actual amount which will be increased for the teachers have yet to be worked out, but an additional \$2600.05 for raising the pay was written into the teachers' salary budget, increasing it from \$75,296.72 this year to \$78,036.77 for the next year.

All this raise in the budget will be made without an increase in the special tax levy for the school district, it was decided.

In addition to the actual increase granted, it is probable that the district will get along with several less teachers for next year and the salaries which they have been getting will be spread out as increases among the other teachers.

The board also ordered immediate action in getting the baseball diamond at the high school in condition. It was decided that the diamond would be leveled off, but will not be put in "top" condition this year. By next year, both the infield and outfield will be sodded.

Grass was ordered for turtling the new football field. It will be planted within the next two weeks and a watering system installed to keep it green through the summer. A complete watering system for the entire field, which will keep it in good condition at all times, will be installed soon.

The board was also informed that all plantings of shrubs and ornamental bushes around the new high school building will be finished within the next few days.
