

RODENT CONTROL WILL BE SHOWN LINN FARMERS

Albany—Trapping, poisoning methods to rid farms of moles and gophers will be shown during the week at a number of places in the county. County Agent Floyd Mullen announced. Mullen will conduct the demonstrations and will be assisted by J. F. Bronson, of the Oregon State college.

The first demonstration will be held at 8 a.m. Friday at the J. C. Harrison farm in the Ash Swale community. The second will be at 10:15 a.m. Friday at the J. H. Farwell farm near Brownsville. The third will be at the George Belva farm in the Charity community near Harrisburg at 1 p.m. and the fourth in the Lake Creek community at a place to be announced later. On Saturday at 8 a.m. a demonstration will be held at the Gilbert Grohman farm in the Dever community and the final demonstration will be held at 10:15 a.m. at the Berlin school.

TAXES NOT PAID

Albany—An order was signed yesterday by Circuit Judge L. G. LeWelling, authorizing foreclosure of Linn county for taxes on more than 500 pieces of property on which taxes for the years prior to 1932 are unpaid, and sale of all such property. SEEK SPRINKLER SCHOOL GROUNDS

Corvallis—Although there was no quorum present at the meeting of the school board Monday night, nothing official could be done, the minority who attended decided to call for bids on a sprinkler system at the new high school property.

The full board had approved purchase of such a system and the bids will be called for as soon as specifications can be drawn. H. L. Mack, school clerk, said Tuesday morning.

The new system will be quite extensive, hooking on to the main pipe line at the north end of Eleventh street and going to the far end of the football field west of the main building. The reason for putting the water pipes in now is so that seeding of the new turf gridiron can be started.

The seeding will be in charge of G. R. Hyslop, head of the farm crops department at Oregon State college. This will be the first turf high school field in the Willamette valley at any of the major schools.

The new system will also be extended to include lines which will water all the plants and shrubs which the new building has been landscaped. The huge lawn which will be grown in front of the building will be worked over by the regular high school garden staff during the summer.
