I sketch your world exactly as it goes."

Beware the Demagogue

Speaking before a Roseburg gathering of Townsend club members Friday evening Rufus Holman, state treasurer and incidentally a candidate for re-election, cautioned the pension seekers to have patience, remain steadfast and "to beware of the demagogue."

The advice is timely, but somewhat indefinite. For the enlightenment of his listeners he might have indulged himself in a definition of the term demagogue.

Naturally, under the circumstances, there are some prominent examples of the species. Candidate Holman might be pardoned for overlooking. For instance, he might include: The candidate for office who climbs on the bandwagon of every organized "ism."

The public official who just before election clamors for the utilization of public trust funds to meet current expenses, knowing full well that such money is not legally available.

The "economist" who appropriates as his own the ideas of others which result in material savings through the refunding of bond issues at lower rates of interest.

The "fireman" who save public records by absent treatment.

The great "I Am," who four years ago admitted responsibility for all of the blessings which flowed from the Meier administration and disowned its blunders.

Excepting such illustrations, Mr. Holman is still qualified to discuss demagogues as an authority.

Utility vs. Beauty

Commenting on the campaign underway for rebuilding the Columbia highway as a straight speedway at the sacrifice of scenic beauty, the Bend Bulletin says:

There can be no better illustration of the extent to which the age is embracing commercialism to the exclusion of all else than the recent remarks of the Oregonian on the subject of the proposed new, water level highway through the Columbia gorge. The Oregonian favors such a road and (the conclusion seems to us a fair one) would be willing to see the beauty of the gorge destroyed to achieve the result.

The Columbia highway was built as a scenic asset and widely advertised as affording the most beautiful scenery to be found in America and it has been a magnet to draw tourists to Oregon. The scenic beauty of the Columbia gorge became world famous. Now it is proposed to rebuild the highway to make it like any other speedway, so that speed maniacs, truck and bus lines can make better time and more money at public expense.

A similar agitation is underway in southern Oregon for rebuilding the Siskiyou highway, also long advertised because of its mountain scenery. The scenery is to be sacrificed for commercial profit. And probably the next campaign will be to similarly modernize the recently completed Oregon coast highway, which will be the only scenic road left.

Thus beauty is sacrificed to utility and we might just as well be in the flat expanse of the prairie states as far as scenery is concerned, and scenery is one of our greatest tourist assets.

IQ Tests Needed

Holding that the present jury system in Oregon "is not functioning, in every case, for the good of human interests" the Portland Federation of Women's organizations has recommended definite changes in the system's structure.

The revision proposed includes a literacy test for proposed jurors; an examination of their hearing; a clear definition of the term "biased opinion"; prohibition of jury service by any owner or manager of disorderly houses and an equal number of challenges for both the state and the defense.

These revisions would help but do not go far enough to insure intelligence among jurors. Literacy is not a proof of intelligence any more than illiteracy is evidence of stupidity. If jurors were given intelligence tests and those with low IQ's automatically eliminated, the jury system would work more satisfactorily.

Incidentally if all public servants and office seekers were compelled to take a mental examination by competent experts and the morons barred, it would immensely improve popular government. The crooks would still be with us, but we would lose the dolts. Such procedure would greatly shorten the ballot at primary elections.

OFFICERS STILL HUNT HOYLMAN

Medford, Ore., April 13 (AP)—No trace has been found of Raleigh H. Hoylman, habitual criminal facing life imprisonment, who slashed and slugged his way to freedom from the county jail last Friday night.

Hoylman attacked Jailer Harry Ingling with a vinegar bottle and a pair of scissors, obtained the jail keys, and after locking up his keeper, fled. Ingling sustained a slashed hand that required 21 stitches to close.

Hoylman was scheduled to appear for a mandatory life imprisonment sentence Saturday morning.

News Behind The News

Washington, April 13.—The wise new dealers make a business of not knowing much about their spending plans. Congressional inquisitors have not been able to get much out of Mr. Hopkins on that subject.

The impression has been created that the federal handout next year will total \$1,500,000,000, as requested of the president, plus whatever is left over from this year, and no one ever knows how much is going to be left over.

That is, no one ever admitted knowing until Mr. Dan Bell, the non-political budget director, testified at a house tax hearing recently. He let it out while his hearers were so deeply involved in the taxation subject that they overlooked it.

Mr. Bell was heard to say that the amount obligated for this fiscal year is \$3,382,000,000 (not the amount allocated, mind you, but the amount which will be spent).

The left-over, he said, would be exactly \$1,128,000,000, on the basis of figures compiled as late as March 20. If you will add this left-over to the new relief fund, you will have President Roosevelt's secret, namely that the relief cost under his bed for the year beginning July 1 will contain about \$2,628,000,000.

Bulge.—Mr. Bell was giving the status of the last relief fund of \$4,800,000,000. He said it was carried on the books at \$4,563,000,000 because some of it included reappropriations from the previous year. It would be incorrect to deduce from his figures that relief expenditures would be \$754,000,000 less next year than this year, as the figures seem to indicate. If you count the bonus, the extra-budgetary appropriations being made in congress, and the relief appropriations switched from the emergency budget into the regular budget for next year, Mr. Roosevelt's total spending fund will be much larger than this year. In other words, Mr. Roosevelt can spend considerably more money next year instead of less, as generally supposed.

Speed.—Swift legislative stepper in congress is Shrewd Senator Smith. And the swiftest step he ever made was on the recent loan legislation.

Mr. Smith was living up to his nickname "Cotton Ed" by championing legislation requiring the commodity credit corporation to market 20,000 to 25,000 bales of its cotton holdings each week. Most of the experts agreed it was a sour idea. They wondered what it would do to the cotton market.

The well known Mr. Oscar Johnson, AAA cotton expert, put his head together with the American Cotton Cooperative association expert and worked out a substitute plan, in private. They agreed to have the government take a 2½-cent loss on its cotton loans by unloading the cotton upon certificate holders who would market it piecemeal.

The plan was to have been announced at 3 p. m., but Smith jumped the gun and introduced legislation embodying the plan as a substitute for his own several hours earlier.

Some of his senatorial friends were still championing his original bill at his committee hearing next day, not knowing that he had abandoned his old horse and was riding another in an opposite direction.

Lobby Diplomats.—The hatred which congressmen have been breathing at lobbyists lately in public statements and speeches apparently does not apply to all lobbyists.

A small veterans' organization, which boosted the soldier bonus, is now delivering a handsome citation to senators and representatives who voted for it. The citation looks like a diploma. At the top is the name of the congressman, written out in full in an impressive way. The body of the document received my one congressman stated that he had been awarded the citation for "outstanding service" in the fight for the soldiers' bonus.

The congressmen are very proud of these citations.

As has been said before, a lobbyist is a public benefactor if you happen to be on his side. He is a despicable crook if you happen to be against him.

Stopples.—Able Senator Jimmy Byrnes is understood to be in the market for ear-stoppers to afford himself the same sort of relief that Senator Glass gets from his ear stoppers. His problem is not anti-noise, but anti-quorum.

Senate leaders successfully sidetracked the Davis resolution calling for a senate inquiry into WPA politics, by sending it to Byrnes' committee on audit and control. Byrnes is supposed to have sought the counsel of a wise wit who sits near him, asking what should be done about the resolution. The response was: "Lose it."

Apparently the only way Mr. Byrnes could be offhanded was to avoid getting a quorum of his committee together. Each day three dead members of his committee appear in the senate, but he declines to see them. However, it is getting more difficult each day. Senator Davis keeps howling for action on his resolution and the quorum keeps re-appearing, declining to go off and die, or even play golf.

GREEK PREMIER DIES SUDDENLY

Athens, April 13 (AP)—Premier Constantine Demerjdis died today.

Demerjdis was found dead in bed by his parents. He had been ill of embolism for ten days.

General John Metaxas, vice premier, was named to succeed him. He will hold also the foreign portfolio.

Demerjdis, lawyer and politician, was 60. He was in Greek politics and served as minister of navy in two cabinets before Greece joined the allies in the World war. He was named premier November 30 last, to lead a non-partisan "amnesty" cabinet five days after the restoration of King George II to the throne.

Doyle, officers said, was a confederate of Alvin Karpis, public enemy No. 1. Rumors that Karpis was with them led to their arrest in an automobile in North Dallas.

Doyle was a hanger-on of the Dillinger gang and a companion of Leo Brothers, St. Louis, who was convicted of the murder of Alfred (Jack) Lingle, Chicago newspaper reporter, officers said.

In addition to being a suspect in the Luer kidnapping, Doyle is wanted for questioning in Kansas City in the slaying of Vivian Chase, his one time companion, and for numerous lesser crimes.

Sherman served terms in the Missouri penitentiary and in Folsom prison, California.

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BLACKIE DOYLE UNDER ARREST

Dallas, Texas, April 13 (AP)—Lloyd (Blackie) Doyle, a suspect in the kidnapping of August Luer at Alton, Ill., and David Sherman, an ex-convict, were held here today.

Officers said they would be charged with the hold-up of a Dallas milk plant last week.

Two women who gave their names as Doris Adams of Topeka, Kans., and Lucille Wilson of Missouri, also were arrested in an apartment which the men were said to have been occupying.

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Anchor and Chain Recovered by Boat

Portland, Ore., April 13 (AP)—The oil tanker Socony-Vacuum recovered its lost anchor from the Astoria harbor at the Columbia river mouth and proceeded toward Seattle today.

The anchor and 270 fathoms of chain, worth several thousand dollars, were lost when the tanker attempted to turn in the river entrance to avoid what Captain P. B. Muller said was an uncharted shoal.

The chain was one of the longest ever carried by a ship calling here.

WALP REFUSES TO ENTER PLEA TO INDICTMENT

trists found Walp sane. The psychologist, Prof. Charles L. Sherman of Willamette University faculty, found him insane at the time of the murder to the extent that he didn't know the difference between right and wrong in commission of the crime which resulted in his ex-wife's death.

The three psychiatrists who found Walp sane at the time of the murder were Dr. John Evans of the state hospital staff; Dr. G. W. Rittman of the staff of Oregon Fairview home and Dr. Verdon L. Hockett, county physician.

Dr. Evans returned a written report to District Attorney Trindle which that official stated was concurred in by the other two physicians. Dr. Evans in his brief report stated that in his opinion Harry LeRoy Walp is and has been sane and was so at the time he shot and killed his former wife and that he knew the difference between right and wrong at the time the killing was committed.

When Walp was conducted into the courtroom at 10 o'clock this morning by Deputy Sheriff Honeycutt the room was comfortably filled with a good percentage of women in attendance.

"There have been extensive investigations the past week in regard to the mental condition of this defendant," said Attorney Burris preliminary to entering a plea for his client.

"A psychologist and the psychiatrists have disagreed. The psychiatrists say that he was sane at the time of the shooting. Dr. Sherman of Willamette faculty, a nationally renowned psychologist, says he was insane at the time and could not distinguish between right and wrong. This difference of opinion is enough to create a reasonable doubt as to the question of premeditation necessary to support a first degree murder charge. He was either insane, and if so not guilty, or he was sane, and if so the crime was manslaughter."

"The defendant doesn't care himself particularly as to what happens to him. I speak more for his family than I do for him. I offer a plea of guilty to second degree murder which makes a life sentence mandatory. In lieu of that I suggest that the district attorney employ a jury to hear the evidence and agree that he be found guilty of first degree murder with a recommendation from the jury of life imprisonment. We would agree to that course."

"I offer this plea against my own judgment and it is done at the request of the family. It seems to me in cases of this kind the law does not contemplate capital punishment where there is doubt existing. And where that doubt has existed capital punishment has not been exercised in this county for many years."

"The defendant is in court to plead to this indictment," responded the district attorney to the plea of defense counsel. "This indictment charges murder in the first degree. The indictment was not found by the district attorney. It was found by the grand jury. The district attorney's office is making no deals. He is to plead guilty or not guilty to this indictment."

"My offer is made to the court," said Burris, "which can accept this plea to the indictment. There is either insanity here or a certain degree of guilt."

"The district attorney's office has certain functions beyond the court's control," said Judge McMahon. "It handles cases subject to the limitations of the indictment. The responsibility for the conduct of the trial, subject to certain limitations by the court to see that the defendant gets an absolutely fair trial, is complete in the district attorney's office in all criminal cases."

At that Burris refused further to enter a plea for the defendant and on motion of the district attorney it was shown on the records that the defendant stood mute and a plea of not guilty was entered for him.

The district attorney suggested that the case be brought to trial next week. Burris objected as not giving the defense enough time for preparation and after some argument the date of Monday, April 27, was agreed on.
