ITALIANS DRIVE AT LAKE TANA

(By Associated Press) Marshal Pietro Badoglio, Italian commander in East Africa, telegraphed from the northern front today that his troops operating in the western section of the northern front are pushing down along the shores of Lake Tana, center of British interests in Ethiopia.

Emperor Haile Selassie, meanwhile, was reported from Addis Ababa, to be leading an army of fresh warriors totaling 300,000 men to battle the fascists in the north.

From Addis Ababa came word that once more the populace fled the city at the approach of Italian airplanes, but again the fascist planes failed to bomb the Ethiopian capital.

Marshal Badoglio said in his communique the troops of the motorized column operating in the vicinity of Lake Tana had captured the peninsula of Gorgora, and had hoisted the Italian tri-color there.

The Italian commander reported an engagement on the southern Ethiopian front, where a small body of Aosta lancers defeated a relatively large body of native defenders, saying the Ethiopian losses were "considerable."

ITALIAN AIR PLANES CIRCLE ADDIS ABABA

Addis Ababa, April 13 (AP)—Nine Italian pursuit airplanes and a big three motor bomber circled Addis Ababa and vicinity today, including the legation area, and flew away northward without bombing or using their machine guns.

The bomber returned and flew over the city again. A station 40 miles north of the capital reported 12 more apparently on the way. Signal guns were fired an hour before the planes reached the city. The roar of the planes' motors, heard six miles away, threw the population into panic and most ran for bomb shelters.

HIT-RUN DEATH CAR DRIVER ARRESTED

Astoria, Ore., April 13 (AP)—The sheriff's office held C. G. Straus, 42, a truck driver, in the county jail today in connection with the hit-and-run death of August Johansen, 72, a laborer, Sunday night. Johansen's body was found on the highway by motorists. The victim had been thrown 100 feet and was crushed, a sheriff's report said. Straus, a married man, was arrested about an hour after the accident presumably occurred when he drove past the scene. Deputy Sheriff Paul Kearney said he noticed a front fender and one headlight were smashed. Kearney said Straus and his wife, who was with him, related that they hit something near the scene but thought it was a dog. The officer said they told him that after the accident they drove home. Later they passed by the scene en route to the house of a friend and upon passing it a third time they were stopped.

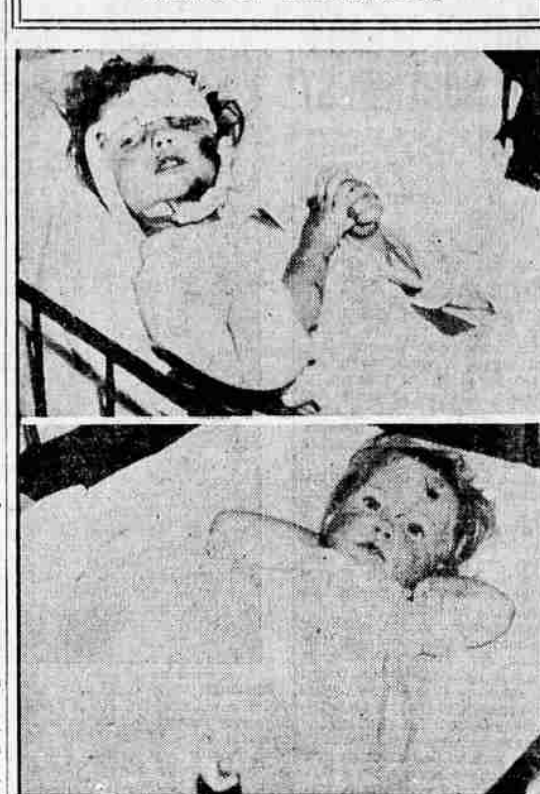

FEHL'S ATTORNEYS PLAN FREEDOM BY HABEAS CORPUS

The governor is advised that prisoners are not subject to release from the prison prior to the expiration of their maximum sentences except by parole or pardon by the executive. For 13 years past it has been the practice of prison officials to release prisoners with records for good behavior automatically at the expiration of their minimum terms.

In event that habeas corpus proceedings are instituted, it was indicated that they would be based upon the contention that the practice of automatically freeing prisoners without the necessity of parole action has been established by custom and that to deny Fehl his liberty would be discriminatory.

"I cannot believe that state officials will make an exception to the established release rule in the case of Fehl, whose conduct as a prisoner has been good," said Rhoten after his conference with the prisoner. He said he expected Schmalz to come to Salem tomorrow morning for a conference.

A meeting of the state parole board announced for this morning to consider Fehl's case was postponed until after the return of Governor Martin from Bremerton, Wn., sometime Tuesday. It was announced by W. L. Gosselin, secretary to the governor and a member of the board.

Under the attorney general's interpretation of the indeterminate sentence law Fehl can be released tomorrow, or at any time prior to the expiration of his full sentence, only by action of the governor. His release, except on the condition that he be not permitted to return to Jackson county, has been protested by George Coddington, district attorney of that county.

Assistant Attorney General Ralph Moody, who wrote the opinion in the Fehl case, said today that the attorney general's office would welcome a habeas corpus proceeding to definitely establish the procedure to be followed in releasing prisoners. "The law is so clear that I cannot understand how the prison officials ever construed it to authorize the automatic discharge of prisoners on the basis of good behavior credit," said Moody. "A habeas corpus proceeding would be a good way to establish that fact beyond any possible doubt."

Reports that rebellion over the attorney general's ruling is brewing among the convicts was discounted today by Warden James Lewis, who pointed out that only a small percentage of the prisoners—chiefly first offenders who are not generally troublesome—are affected by the ruling.

"There has been some discussion of the matter among prisoners, but no signs of trouble whatever," said Lewis. The warden said that as soon as he has had an opportunity to confer with Governor Martin he proposes to advise all of the convicts officially of the future policy to be pursued relative to paroles.

3 BALLOT TITLES WRITTEN FOR BILLS

Three ballot titles were written today by Attorney-General Van Winkle for circulation of initiative petitions, which must be completed July 1, can start.

Constitutional amendments prohibiting food taxes of any kind and creating a non-political state game commission and state board of forestry were two of the measures. The third was the non-compulsory military training bill for state institutions of higher education.

Under the game commission amendment, all game funds would be deposited with the state treasurer to be spent only for promotion, protection, propagation and preservation of fish and game.

The anti-food tax amendment is levied a sales tax already defeated aimed primarily at any attempt to three times at the polls.

GASOLINE PRICES BOOSTED AGAIN

San Francisco, April 13 (AP)—The Standard Oil company of California today announced another two-cent increase in the per gallon price of gasoline sold in California, Oregon, Washington, Arizona and Nevada.

A similar increase, ranging from two to two and one-half cents, was made effective a little more than a week ago.

Standard's announcement today said: "Restoring prices to the level which existed before the gasoline market of the Pacific coast became demoralized, the Standard Oil company of California announces an advance of two cents per gallon for the three grades of gasoline."

"This advance is effective immediately in California, Oregon, Washington, Arizona and Nevada."

Other major companies followed suit immediately.

The new price advance established the following retail schedule in San Francisco: Ethyl gasoline 30 cents per gallon; first quality 18 cents; third grade 16 cents.

2 OF 39 PAROLED PRISONERS RETURNED

Thirty-five prisoners were released from the state penitentiary by parole during the past nine months, and only two returned as violators. Dr. Floyd Utter, Salem, member of the board, announced today.

During the period, ending the first of April, the board has considered 168 cases, Utter said, out of which paroled of 42 were recommended to the governor. Of this number the executive approved 39. One of these refused a parole, while the time of three others when the parole will take effect has not yet been reached.

Governor Martin refused to issue three paroles of those recommended, the report showed. Paroles during the period that were not issued for those whose minimum sentences had been served and released automatically on good behavior. An attorney general's opinion this week held paroles would be necessary for any released under the maximum sentences.

HAYWOOD BROWN FINED FOR PICKETING

Milwaukee, April 13 (AP)—Haywood Brown, New York columnist and president of the American Newspaper Guild, and six other persons arrested in connection with a newspaper strike demonstration March 31, were convicted in district court today.

Fines of \$10 and costs were imposed by Judge George E. Page on Brown, charged with interfering with a police officer, and Alfred Lauterbach, former employee of the Wisconsin News which is involved in a Guild strike, who was charged with disorderly conduct.

Three of the defendants, also charged with disorderly conduct, drew fines of \$5 and costs.

HOWARD THURSTON, MAGICIAN, DIES

Miami Beach, Fla., April 13 (AP)—Howard Thurston, 66, one of the world's most famous magicians, died at his winter home here today.

Pneumonia, contracted as the result of a sudden hemorrhage which occurred two weeks ago, was the immediate cause of death.

The master of magic, compelled to go into retirement last fall when he collapsed after a performance at Charleston, W. Va., had planned until March 30—when he suffered the hemorrhage—on returning to the stage this spring.

He had performed before royalty of Europe and before many of America's important personages. Just four months ago he announced he intended to return to the stage, impelled by "the small of grease paint and my love for the theater."

Tiny Pheasants to be Tenderly Mothered

Portland, Ore., April 13 (AP)—Tiny pheasants raised in captivity for restocking Oregon hunting areas, will be tenderly "mothered."

The state game commission appointed Miss Margaret Whipple, 22, honor graduate in poultry husbandry from Oregon State college, superintendent of the new incubator and brooder at Eugene.

Mahoney Criticizes McNary Power Bill

Portland, Ore., April 13 (AP)—Mayor Willis Mahoney of Klamath Falls, democratic candidate for the senate, described Senator McNary's (R.-Ore.) Bonneville power bill as "a subterfuge and a complete sell-out to the private power interests."

Mahoney urged "friends of public ownership" to back the bill introduced by Senator Homer T. Bone.

Circulation of petitions for creation of a Multnomah county power district will start this week, Mahoney said.

SILVER CREEK PLANS OUTLINED

Development of the Silver Creek Falls district as a recreational area for person living within a radius of 100 miles was outlined Monday noon before members of the Salem chamber of commerce by W. A. Langville, project manager of the recreational department, national park system, and Robert E. Floyd assistant regional property manager for the park service.

The park will be open to groups as well as individuals. Many of them coming from Portland. So far Salem organizations have made no application for use of the park, Langville said. Ultimate development of the area under control contemplated, erection of cabins, recreation hall, administration building, construction of fish rearing ponds for restocking Silver creek, building of roads and trails, reforestation and a general clean-up of the entire district. The area under control embraces some 5000 acres. However, it is hoped the entire watershed will be included.

The area will be divided into sections for boys, girls, children and adults. Erection of 30 cabins in the girls' section is slated for this spring. The principal building project will not get under way until the next fiscal year when the balance of the \$200,000 appropriation will be available.

POLICEMAN DROWNS BOAT CAPSIZES

Oregon City, Ore., April 13 (AP)—Patrolman Clifford W. Davis, of the Portland police department, was drowned when his boat capsized four miles above Carver Sunday, state police learned today when they rescued his companion, William A. Garnette, from an island where he had been all night.

Garnette was suffering from exposure and hysteria but physicians said his condition was not serious. The men intended to drift downstream to the river mouth, fishing from the boat. When the boat overturned in an eddy they both started swimming for the island but Davis, encumbered by heavy fishing clothing, sank. Garnette reached the island where he was marooned until a party of state police under Sergeant H. E. Mends, came down the river in a boat searching for the missing pair.

SALEM HI ORATORS WINNERS IN CONTEST

Salem high school won two first places, a second and an honorable mention in the state high school speaking contest which was sponsored by Willamette university Friday and Saturday. Bill Thomas won first place in extemporaneous speaking; Dean Goodman tied for first place with Marjorie Waters of Dallas for first place in the serious division of interpretative speaking, while Dean Ellis placed second in extemporaneous; Marjorie Craney received honorable mention in the humorous division of the latter event.

Other contest winners included: Humorous interpretation, Seldon Baker, Franklin, first; Katherine Fitzgerald, Grant, second; serious interpretation, Hope Ballough, St. Helens, second; and Frances Robinson, Grant, honorable mention; extemporaneous, Albert Klassen, Dallas, honorable mention.

Winners were presented with trophies by Dean F. M. Erickson of Willamette.

REGISTRATION TO CLOSE TUESDAY EVE

Registration is scheduled to close tomorrow evening at 3 o'clock. While considerable acceleration has been given to registration the past few days it is to in any way catch up with the registration before the general election in 1934.

FEET HURT?

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EARMARKING OF RELIEF FUNDS

Washington, April 13 (AP)—House advocates of a \$700,000,000 public works appropriation decided today to earmark almost half of the \$1,500,000,000 work relief fund he is asking of congress.

The leaders of the bloc, favoring turning over almost half of the relief appropriation to Secretary of Interior Harold I. Ickes, and opposed to part of WPA Administrator Harry Hopkins' program, named a committee to circulate the petition among members of the bloc.

Meanwhile, a delegation from the workers alliance went before the house appropriations sub-committee working on the relief bill and urged that Hopkins be removed as "relief dictator." They suggested a board, with workers represented, be named to supervise the program.

The public works bloc under today's agreement, will work under a committee of 15 house members, representing each of the 15 PWA zones. Each member will be responsible for circulating the petition among members from the zone he represents. When it is completed it will be presented to the president.

Rep. Alfred Bleier, D., N. Y., leader of the bloc, said public works projects were hanging fire in virtually every congressional district. He argued that WPA employment costs were virtually the same as under the PWA supervised by Ickes.

EASTER IN ROME LACKS CEREMONY

Rome, April 13 (AP)—Easter in Rome and Vatican City lacked its usual pomp and ceremony, and was celebrated quietly.

Pope Pius, nearing his 76th birthday, and under a great strain, thought it unwise to risk his health by attending public mass. Instead, he celebrated mass in his private chapel and Cardinal Pacelli, papal secretary of state, officiated for him in high mass at St. Peter's before 12,000 people.

Cathedrals and churches were crowded all over the country. Sacred relics of St. Peter's were exposed, including a reputed fragment of the true cross, the handkerchief of St. Veronica, supposed to bear Christ's image, the sacred lance which tradition has it pierced Christ's arm, and a twig of the crown of thorns.

Sheep Move With Arrival of Spring
La Grande, Ore., April 13 (AP)—The coming of warm weather was the signal today for the movement of sheep to rangelands.

Stockmen were forced to feed sheep five months because of the unusually long winter. About 1200 ewes and 1500 lambs taken to the low hills near Telocast headed the parade of sheep going to rangeland.
