KING FUAD OF EGYPT PASSES, SON SUCCEEDS. (Continued from page 1) Fuad, who celebrated his 68th birthday anniversary March 26, had been in indifferent health many months. He had never fully recovered from his serious illness of 1934 when numerous foreign specialists were summoned to the summer palace at Montazah. The troubled political situation in Cairo, including the revival of the Wafd party strength, leading up to recent street rioting, the interplay of British and Italian opinion, and the emphasis on military questions made it more difficult for Crown Prince Farouk's departure from England tomorrow.
