

CCC ARBORETUM WORKERS SHIFT AFTER BIG JOB

Corvallis—CCC camp arborist workers who will move from the camp near here and shift to Montana in a short while, have put in a total of 30,935 man days of work at the camp and side camps during the year they have been located here. That includes merely work of the technical agency, according to figures compiled.

The biggest single job of work done has been the completion of 5.1 miles of truck trails, while five miles of fire break have been constructed out of a total of 14 to be constructed. Later crews will finish this work. The fire break will be made all around the Peavy arborist camp to protect the timber there and will be passable by light motor transportation. It will also be used as a fence line.

Much improvement has been made in the arborist forest by the group. The company has also constructed a mile and a half of new telephone line and done maintenance work on 25 miles more. The men have done such work on maintenance of truck trails, including grading, cleaning out ditches, replacing culverts and general cleaning up of the trails.

Aside from their regular routine work, the camp sent athletic teams to compete in the Corvallis softball league last summer and in the city basketball league this winter. The basketball team of the camp here won the championship of the Vancouver barracks CCC district and then defeated the championship team of the Fort Lewis district.
