Canny Scot's Farm Raises Fine Horses

Dryden was born in Dundee, Scotland, and came to the United States as a young man of 22. He came to Woodburn 46 years ago and a year later located on the farm near McKee. His Scotch thrift and industry have enabled him to develop one of the finest farms in the country, famous for blooded horses and Guernsey cattle.
