

TWO TRANSIENTS FACING CHARGES FOR BURGLARIES

Albany—Frank Martin, 56, and George Koby, 26, both transients, are in jail here in default of \$500 bond, each pending preliminary hearings on burglary in a dwelling charges in justice court Friday morning.

Martin and Koby are accused of burglarizing the Ernest Schell general merchandise store at Sweet Home, early Wednesday, and of being the two men whom Schell frightened away by firing pistol shots after he was awakened by the pair as he slept in his apartment over the store.

The fugitives were captured Wednesday night by county and state officers on the Oregon Electric railway four miles east of Sweet Home. The capture climaxed an all-day man-hunt by the officers who tracked the men from a camp on a hill southwest of Sweet Home into the brush near the Santiam river. After dark the two men attempted to make their way to Lebanon.

The officers found a quantity of spring steel in the men's knapsacks, which matched the improvised key found at the Schell store. Schell, in his attempt to halt the disappearing men, jumped from the roof of a porch over the entrance of the store onto the ground in his bare feet and was uninjured.
