TEACHERS GET ASSURANCE OF STEADY WAGES

Corvallis—Following two postponements on account of the lack of a quorum, the school board met in the office of the superintendent and the matter of teachers' wages was discussed.

Routine matters were completed and most of the evening spent in discussing the question of salary readjustments passed last month, in which the salaries of several teachers were cut slightly in order to arrive at a minimum basis.

Referring to protests on cuts at this time, the board finally decided to rescind their former action and a readjustment in 13 cases was made. Under the new ruling there will be no cuts. Several of the teachers will draw the same next year as at present and others will get slight increases.

In an effort to arrive at a minimum rate recognition of experienced rating in the case of all teachers now employed was recommended. With this in mind the board placed the minimum salary at \$1080 a year.

The board also discussed the coming school election which will be held June 15. There are two vacancies to be filled, those of Joe Hollingsworth and E. B. Lemon.
