

GOODWILL CARNIVAL PROVES SUCCESSFUL EVENT

MARTIN GIVES MAIN ADDRESS FOR MONMOUTH

Monmouth—Memorial day marked the close of the two-day goodwill carnival held here with Governor Charles H. Martin speaking during the afternoon program following the barbecue lunch in the city park at noon and a civic parade at 2 o'clock. Governor Martin was introduced by C. F. Gillette and occupied the speaker's platform with Mayor F. R. Bowersox, Senator Dean Walker and O. L. Groves. Mayor Bowersox presented Queen Clara Mae Haller to the governor, together with her attendants, Ruth Tilton, Ruth Seelye, Mildred Miller and Elizabeth Caldwell.

First place in the parade commercial section went to the Price Lumber company, with the Molalla rodeo entry second and Riley's dairy, third. In the fraternal group Rickreall grange won first, Monmouth grange second and the Oak Point community club third.

The afternoon program was in keeping with Memorial day with ex-servicemen providing a special section in the parade. Marion Has Interesting Past

Pickard family responsible for early development of thriving community 15 miles south of Salem, once the only city in the valley which exceeded the capital city in rail shipments.

Marion, our little community, originated from a portion of Oliver Pickard's 640-acre donation land claim in 1870, who donated 100 acres to the Oregon-California Railroad Co. French Poppy Seeds Placed Upon Graves

Dallas—The Memorial day service, conducted at the I. O. O. F. cemetery took place between showers Saturday morning. The service was held on a plot of ground on which had been set up crosses of all veterans interred in the cemetery, with a flagpole in the foreground.

It opened with a selection by the city band followed by a prayer by Comrade S. E. Whitworth, chaplain of Carl B. Fenton post of the American Legion. A reading was given by Betty Smith, junior high school student, and vocal solo by Hubert Springsteen. An address was given by post commander William W. Blackley followed by a 30-second period of silence, the salute to the dead by a firing party from Company L. O. N. G. and the sounding of taps by H. N. Stoudemeyer, director of the city band.

At the conclusion of the reading poppies grown from the seed of Flanders poppies, sent to Mrs. Lynn from France and grown here, were placed at the foot of each cross by two Boy Scouts.

Flags and flowers were placed on the graves of all veterans buried in the cemetery by members of the auxiliary and the Legion following the service. The general arrangements for the service were in the hands of Comrade Clarence T. Smith, chairman of the post Memorial day committee, and Dale Smith.

SOLDIER DEAD PAID TRIBUTE BY SILVERTON

Silverton—No member of the G. A. R. "fell in" with the other veterans this year at the Silverton Memorial day program as the last Civil War veteran, Marcus L. Latham, answered the final call during the year.

In line of march to the cemetery were the color bearers of the Oregon National guard, Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion; the 4-L band boys, company "T" O. N. G.; Women's Relief corps, and veterans of the Spanish war, Foreign wars and Legion. Formal ceremonies were at the Silverton City cemetery. Miller's cemetery was the scene of ceremonies last Sunday with the Veterans of Foreign Wars and W.R.C. in charge.

Father Arthur Sullivan of the Silverton St. Paul's Catholic church, was the speaker at the 10 o'clock program at the armory Saturday forenoon. He stressed a patriotism of intelligence and alertness as a far greater need in times of peace than war, in his subject of "Have We Forgotten?"

James A. Scarth, commander of the American Legion, announced the program selections. The 4-L Boys band, directed by Joe Hassenstab, gave a brief concert and accompanied the singing of the national anthem by the audience with Mrs. J. J. Lewis leading; introduced from the places of honor on the stage were Mrs. Roy Davenport, president of the Legion auxiliary; Mrs. Jerry DeSart, president of the Veterans of Foreign Wars auxiliary; Rev. Frank W. Zook, pastor of the First Christian church of Silverton, who offered the invocation and pronounced the benediction; Father Arthur Sullivan, speaker of the day; Chris Quail of the Spanish veterans and Veterans of Foreign wars, and Harry Wilson, who read John A. Logan's Memorial day orders.
