Van Winkle ruled today. The opinion was rendered after the Oregon State Embalmers' examining board when asked if the proffer of the free service by a Portland firm was in violation of the statute. Van Winkle ruled that the promise was "not an offer for value since the same is a purely gratuitous offer not based upon a consideration," and therefore does not come within the limitation statute.

TELLS VETS TO STAY AT HOME

Washington, June 1 (AP)—Veterans leaders have named June 16 and June 17 as "stay-at-home nights" for men who are expecting parcels of bonus "baby" bonds from the government.

Because the registered parcels must be handed to the veteran in person, and not to someone else at the same address, veterans' units in cities and villages throughout the country are making special plans to aid the postman in making deliveries.

James E. Van Zandt, commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, said today the ex-soldiers' organization plan to place automobiles at the disposal of postmen in many cities, and will send veterans along with the mailman to help him identify the addressee and make delivery.

Post office department officials said special night deliveries for the bond packages had been recommended, especially to postmasters in the larger cities.

From these post offices, notices of the night delivery plans will be sent out to veterans in advance. "This notice is not to be accepted as identification for delivery of the registered letter," the department warned, "and should be so worded."

For veterans who miss the postman when he rings at their homes, the packages will be made available at special windows in the post-office.

NO CHAMPIONSHIPS UNLESS EARNED

There will be no championships handed out in the various lines of athletic endeavor in the Northwest conference unless a team is really entitled to it. This was the word brought back to Salem by Coach Roy S. Keene after attending the spring meeting of conference representatives held at Walla Walla last week. Due to the fact that one or two of the conference members fail to schedule contests with all others, split championships and others without particular significance have been the rule in recent years.

Under an agreement reached at Walla Walla all teams will meet each other during the season or automatically forfeit their chances for a title.

As an example of the unsatisfactory manner in which athletics within the conference have been handled, Willamette university's baseball team was created out of an opportunity to meet Whitman college in the final because the Bearcats had not played as many games as had College of Puget Sound. Willamette had scheduled two additional games with Albany college but the latter failed to place a team in the field.

Washington, June 1 (AP)—President Roosevelt today sent to the senate the nomination of Claude L. Draper of Wyoming for re-appointment to the federal power commission for the term expiring June 22, 1941.

Brandt ruling that Port Orford was a legally incorporated municipality drew from Attorney Collier Buffington the statement that the case will be appealed. Judge Brandt held election notices complied with the law. Buffington, acting for unnamed clients, challenged the vote which made Port Orford the first incorporated town in Curry county.

MAYOR TO AID TOWNSENDITES

Mayor V. E. Kuhn promised to help the Townsend organization along—now that the election is over—as he welcomed delegates to the state-wide convention here yesterday.

Although he is not a member of the pension plan club, the mayor spoke most favorably of the Townsend plan, and his remarks were greeted with wild applause and the shouted approval of the more than 1000 persons who jammed the high school auditorium to overflowing.

Kuhn said he believed Dr. F. E. Townsend was being "persecuted" by the congressional investigation, and the crowd roared its sympathy. "Now that the election is over I'm going to get out and try to help you folks," the mayor said. "This is the greatest convention I have had the pleasure of welcoming here. They wanted me to welcome them, but they had to stall around until they got some one there to listen. And when I spoke there were only 14 persons there."

Oregon Wage Law Upheld Says Bailey

It was appealed on the grounds it was a violation of the Fourteenth amendment, which guaranteed rights of citizens under due process of law.

The supreme court upheld the state law when Justice Brandeis did not participate in the decision, and a divided vote affirms the lower court, Bailey said.

Without knowing the details of the decision today, Bailey said, he believed the action would not necessarily invalidate Oregon's law.

Shortly after the supreme court passed on Oregon's appeal, the court invalidated a similar one from Kansas, Bailey said. This did not affect the state law here. "I don't believe the supreme court's opinion will affect our law now," he added.

Oregon's law provides minimum wages for women and minors and prohibits "unreasonable" hours and unsanitary working conditions. The minimum wage was set as "adequate to meet the cost of living and maintain good health." It is administered by the state welfare commission, which Charles Gram, state labor commissioner, is secretary.

GRADUATION WEEK STATE UNIVERSITY

Eugene, June 1 (AP)—The pageantry of graduation held the spotlight in Eugene over the weekend as 467 Oregon seniors moved toward the time when they would receive their diplomas at the 59th annual commencement exercise tonight.

Starting with alumni day Saturday the campus was alive with students and visitors here for the event. Yesterday Bishop Edwin O'Hara, of Butte Falls, Montana, gave the baccalaureate address at McArthur Court and this evening Dr. J. Dunbar Speath, president of the University of Kansas City, will give the commencement address in the same place.

R. Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor of higher education in Oregon, and Willard Marks, chairman of the board of higher education in Oregon, will be featured on the program tonight.

This is the first time commencement has been held in the evening, always being scheduled in the morning in previous years.

SCION OF RICH FAMILY MISSING

New York, June 1 (AP)—A search for William Webster Thelle, 15, descendant of Daniel Webster and prospective heir to millions, spread to third rate hotels and hobo jungles across the country today. He disappeared mysteriously 28 days ago.

His father, head of two Wall street corporations, disclosed that a nationwide search by private detectives produced not a single clue. The boy's mother, the former Ima Green Webster of Siloam Springs, Ark., was under a physician's care.

Thelle said he did not believe William was kidnapped, but feared that in visits to cheap burlesque houses and dance halls he might have picked up associates who would attempt to turn his connections to advantage. Police learned the boy often visited a 10 cent dance hall in Harlem.

Private detectives discovered William had collected a small sum of money in the week preceding his disappearance by selling his school books at from 10 to 40 cents each. His father thought he had possibly \$40.

M'CLAIN ARRESTED AS DRUNK DRIVER

GOVERNMENT WINS GOLD CLAUSE CASE

Washington, June 1 (AP)—The supreme court today granted the administration's plea that it refuse to answer questions certified to it by the court of claims in the gold clause test suit of the Dixie Terminal Co., of Cincinnati.

The suit is that filed by Robert A. Taft, son of the late chief justice and President William Howard Taft, seeking to recover in the old gold dollar value interest on a \$50 gold clause Liberty bond owned by the terminal company.

The suit involves only a \$1.97 interest coupon, but according to Taft, at the time it was filed, might cost millions if the courts held in his favor.

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
