WATER SYSTEM RATES REMAIN AT OLD POINT

Jefferson—The city of Jefferson receive notice this week from the PWA headquarters that the city could proceed with the new water system as planned without raising rates.

Early in May, the city council received a request from PWA officials to raise the water rate from \$1 for 3000 gallons to \$1 for 2000 gallons and 50 cents for each additional thousand gallons. At this time the council decided that before raising the water rates in Jefferson, they would not accept the aid of PWA funds.

The contract for the reconstruction of the city water system was awarded in April to the West Coast Construction company of Seattle, Wash. The reconstruction work will include laying of new water pipes of creosoted wood dipped in tar, and relining of the city reservoir. The water supply will be changed to wells instead of the Santiam river. Work on this project will start soon.
