

SENATORS PLAYING STRONG TOLEDO CLUB SUNDAY

BEVENS DRAWS JOB STOPPING LION HITTING

Bill Bevens, who a week ago held the strong Blitz-Weinhardt club to two safe blows, and considered one of the most promising of the younger crop of Willamette valley moundmen, will probably draw the tough assignment of stopping the Toledo Lions Sunday afternoon at Olinger field in a State league contest. The Lions, credited with being the class of the State circuit, will be making their initial 1936 league appearance in Salem, at 2:30 o'clock.

Following last Saturday's game which the Senators won 1 to 0, in the ninth inning, the Blitz-Weinhardt players gave Bevens credit for displaying more speed than had previously been viewed by the beer-men. With Howard Maple, former catcher for the Washington club of the American league, to direct his slants, Bevens should prove a serious hurdle for the Toledo club to surmount.

Manager Leo Edwards has one of the best balanced clubs to represent Salem in several years. While the players are all young, they have had good training and are equally strong in defense and offense.

The Senators will likely face the slants of Pilette Sunday. Former Coast league chucker, Pilette still has plenty of stuff on the ball. Associated with him are several players who are better than the average run of semi-pro performers. These include Hauser, catcher; McClain, third baseman, who worked with Albany for a number of years; Hoover, home run hitting left fielder, and Bauer, center fielder.

Jerry Gastineau, who was forced to abandon the hill during Sunday's game with Albany, and "Sneak" Wilson, outfielder, will be held in reserve during the Toledo game. Gastineau pitched last Sunday with an injured finger.

Other State league games will consist of Eugene at Albany, and Woodburn at Bend. Hop Gold draws a bye.

RABBIT'S FOOT GIVEN CREDIT BY LOU GEHRIG

To Lou Gehrig—"Iron Horse Lou," the indestructible infielder—a matter of playing in 1,700 straight games without a break, eclipsing anything in the record books, ancient or modern, requires no exceptional baseball ability.

The New York Yankees' glutton-for-punishment first sacker, who starts on his second 1,700 today, says it's "just luck"—nothing else—this all-time mark of his.

But, considering that the man has been in there, getting his daily bats, in spite of broken bones, ripped muscles, lumbago, and any number of other physical beatings through 11 years, there's no denying Lou has plenty on the ball besides a rabbit's foot.

He sets a record every day he shows up on the job. He erased the old endurance mark three years ago, and since then has been making a new one daily.

Lou celebrated game No. 1,700 yesterday with a homer inside the park and a long fly that drove in another run, just about to hand the Yanks a 4-3 victory over the Cleveland Indians. It was a sorely-needed win, since the second place Boston Red Sox stretched their streak to four straight by belting the Chicago White Sox 8-6, and stayed two and a half games back.

The Washington Senators, meantime, went into a tie for fourth place with Detroit by downing the world champion Tigers 6-2, while the Athletics and St. Louis were idle.

In the National league, Dizzy Dean won his tenth game—the first big league pitcher of the year to turn the trick—as the Cardinals walloped the New York Giants 9-2, thereby increasing their league lead to four full games.

"When we reach the outskirts of the city," said he, "I move out of the driving seat and say to my wife, 'Here, you take it.' And even then I don't enjoy the ride."

WIRE SEEKING ADDED MONEY

Claiming that all classes, sportsmen and non-sportsmen alike should be interested in the building up and preservation of the state's fish and game resources because of their attraction to the tourist, Frank B. Wire, state game supervisor, advocated an appropriation for development work during a recent address before the Albany chamber of commerce. This appropriation would supplement the money derived from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses.

Wire pointed out that while \$85,000,000 has been spent on highways in Oregon during the past five years, only \$2,000,000 has been available for the support of wild life. The good roads have made fish and game more in demand and consequently more difficult to maintain, he said. He added that a general appropriation would bring good dividends to the taxpayer since each tourist leaves an average of 25 cents a day while in the state.

Twenty-nine million trout were liberated in the streams of the state last year, Wire said. Last year, 12,000,000 fish eggs were secured from the lakes and streams while this year the prospects are for about 5,000,000.

Due to the cleaning out of fence rows by farmers and the greater use of sheep, cover for birds is becoming a serious problem, the supervisor declared. Thirty-two thousand pheasants were liberated last year, with prospects of 40,000 this year. Wire said he was working on a plan to bring in a new supply from China.

The senior events were to start at 2 p. m., preceded by a juniors meet.

Among other stars entered were James Edwards, Oregon State diver, Forbes J. Mack, Salem Y.M.C.A. 100-meter dash, and John Olsen, Oregon State diver.

Entered in the junior events were Robert Boardman, Robert Bushnell, Herbert Hoffman, Bill Shinn, all of the Salem Y.M.C.A., and entered in the 50-meter free style events.

CASTER DROPS OAKLAND INTO SECOND PLACE

There were plenty of coast league managers to agree today with P. K. Wrigley in the thought, "It seems to be a bad year on pitching all around."

Twenty-one hurriers were called to duty in the four coast games yesterday and last night. Only one of that multitude had a good night. He was George Caster of Portland, the only starting pitcher to finish.

His seven-hit performance dropped Oakland down 13-4 into a second place tie with the Missions and boosted Portland over San Diego into fifth place.

Instrumental in the change standings was Seattle's eleven inning 7-6 victory over Sacramento, Los Angeles 8-7 triumph over San Diego, and the Missions 12-9 win from the San Francisco Seals.

Caster was aided by the potent batting of third baseman Fred Bedore and catcher Earl Brucker. Each three hits, including a homer with none on, driving in nine runs between them. Every Beaver batsman hit but Shortstop Dudley Lee, who contributed one of the three errors that gave the Oaks two unearned runs.

A wild throw by Shortstop Joe Dobbins, over-eager to cut off Hank Bonetti at third, decided the Seattle game in the eleventh. He was trying for a double play after fielding Art Hunt's grounder. Fred Muller, Seattle second sacker, hit a four bagger and two singles in five times, but was outscored for consistency at bat by Jim Grilk, senator first baseman, who connected four times in five trips to the plate.

SIX COUNTIES PROVIDE FISH

Portland, June 6 (AP)—Oregon's fishermen will find luck the best in six counties this week-end, the state game commission said today.

Hood River, Lane, Douglas, Coos, Curry and Union counties provide the best fishing opportunities. The Hood River is still high but fishing fair and nice catches of steel head are being made from the west fork in the vicinity of Punct-bowl and from the east fork south of Dee. North Lake and Badger lake are producing limit catches but a walk of seven miles is necessary to reach Badger lake.

Skilled fishermen were making fair catches in the McKenzie river in Lane county but Lakes in western Lane and Douglas counties offer better opportunities.

Trout are biting in the north and south forks of the Coquille river and good catches are being made from the upper Smith river, big mill creek and Sweets creek. Ten Mile lake and Loon lake are yielding good catches of trout and bass. All streams are clear in Union county and Beaver creek is in perfect angling condition, said the report.

Trout fishing was fair in Eagle creek in Clackamas county and the lower Deschutes river in Wasco county was high but clear. In Jackson and Josephine counties, Salmon in the Rogue are much smaller, indicating the last of the spring run and Diamond lake in Klamath county will furnish good fishing when weather conditions are favorable.

Blind Youth 'Sees' Games Thru Sound

San Francisco, June 6 (AP)—Blindness plunged Ernest Blumenthal into a colorless world 19 years ago, but he "sees" as many coast league games as the most inveterate fan.

Rarely is he absent from a game at Seals' stadium, to which he is guided by his faithful Shepherd dog, Flou.

"I can tell when a ball is hit on the ground by the dull sound it makes when leaving the bat," he explained. "When it goes in the air

it leaves the bat with a smart crack. "A foul tip makes a peculiar whirling sound."

"I can tell when the play is made at first base by the distance of the sound and the time it takes the fans to shout."

"I can tell when the infield is trying for a double play by the delay necessitated in whipping the ball to second base instead of first base directly."

"I wish you people with sight wouldn't feel sorry for me. I get more kick out of baseball than you do."
