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ALL GRADUATES WILL BE PLACED JOBS THIS YEAR

Mt. Angel—After a high mass of thanksgiving in the convent chapel, during which 27 graduates in cap and gown received holy communion, the 25 graduates of Mt. Angel college, normal and academy were served breakfast in the students' dining room with Rev. Vincent Koppert, O.S.B., and Rev. John Cumiskey, O.S.B., as guests of honor and with Miss Anne Bigler, outgoing student body president, and Miss Marie Grosjacques, president-elect, heading the students' tables.

The graduates in cap and gown and a large number of parents and friends were present at the solemn benediction of the most blessed sacrament, which took place at 7:30 p. m. Right Rev. Thomas Meier, O.S.B., abbot of St. Benedict's abbey, gave the benediction, assisted by Rev. M. J. Early, C.S.C. of Portland university, and Rev. John Cumiskey, O.S.B.

Immediately after benediction, the graduation exercises took place in the normal school auditorium, during which Rev. Father Early gave the commencement address and Abbot Thomas conferred diplomas upon the first two graduates of Mt. Angel college extension, 19 normal, one junior college, and 13 high school graduates.

Rev. Vincent Koppert, rector of Mt. Angel college, publicly announced that the two college graduates have signed their contracts to teach in Oregon high schools next year. The graduates of the normal school have already been placed, thus assuring Mt. Angel of a probable 100 per cent placement of this year's graduates.

Iron Replaces Wooden Mains Scio's System

Scio—Installation of 560 feet of new six-inch castiron water mains will begin as soon as material can be ordered. It was voted at the regular June meeting of the Scio city council.

The new mains, to replace wooden ones in use nearly forty years, will reach the two blocks along West Mill street from the corner of Main to the school house.

The fund for the pipes has been somewhat depleted by repairs to the pump, and allocation of \$105 for the two new hydrants. A sum of approximately \$1000 remains for the purpose. The cost iron pipe is estimated to cost about 90 cents per foot. Remainder of the fund will be expended to purchase couplings and other equipment and for labor.

Councilmen A. L. Plummer and Fred Roadarmel will be in charge of the new project.

Council has under consideration oiling and grading of two road approaches to the city. Councilman Roadarmel, chairman of the streets and public properties committee, was instructed to ascertain cost of the work if done by county equipment. About \$1100 is available in the road fund for the work.

Regular bills for labor and power services were allowed. Mayor W. A. Ewing presided at the meeting. Councilman G. F. Ryan, W. F. Gill, A. L. Plummer and Fred Roadarmel were present. Councilmen N. I. Morrison and W. J. Chrony were absent.
