Angels Struggle Back To Sunlight; Senators Take Turn in Cellar

Los Angeles' baseball Angels, accustomed in recent years to breathing the rarified air of the stratosphere and in the last few weeks to the dank atmosphere of the coast league cellar, took a wiff today of the clear air normally inhaled by human beings.

Sunshine and light came back into the Seraphs' life when they took a series of 5 games to 2 from the San Diego Padres. They were materially aided by the current circuit leaders from Seattle who shoved the Sacramento Senators down into the cellar 4 games to 1.

The only three games played yesterday were won with the aid of pitchers whose bats connected at the right time. The Angels split a double header 4-2, 2-7 while the San Francisco Seals struggled 12 innings to win from the San Francisco Missions 5-2. Rain shut off games in Portland and Seattle.

Jack Salstrom broke a 2-2 deadlock in the ninth at San Diego and won his second game of the series by tripling and scoring on Don Hurst's single.

Just as heroic was the performance of Wally Herbert, whose left handed hurling won both of the Padres' games during the week. He hit a homer with one on to lead a four run fourth inning rally in the nightcap.

At San Francisco little Ken Sheehan was aided by Eddie Joost's error, the only miscue of the game. Sheehan led off in the 12th with a double and was on third with two away when Ted Norbert bounced an easy one to the Reds' third baseman. In his eagerness to make the last out, Joost dropped the ball and Sheehan came home with the deciding run. Two more scored before the side was out.

Twelve thousand watched the long pitcher's battle between Sheehan and Wayne Osborne. The Missions took the series 4-3.

Rain kept Oakland and Portland off the field most of the week, the teams dividing their only two games.

Angler Dies Near Badger Lake Sunday

Hood River, Ore., June 8 (AP)—Rudolph Imholz, 41, Portland angler, died early Sunday from injuries of mysterious origin while on a fishing expedition to isolated Badger lake on the east side of Mt. Hood.

State Policeman Warren of Oregon City and Coroner C. G. Anderson of Hood River said they believed his neck was broken. His face also was bruised.

Pete Druze and Albert Hulett, who accompanied Imholz to the lake Saturday, said they had to return at night but Imholz was having good luck fishing and wished to remain, officers related.

At about 4 a.m. Sunday three other Portland anglers, W. S. Redman, Foster D. Wenz and Walter Welin enroute to the same fishing grounds, heard calls of distress and found Imholz under a log. He died soon after. Officers said he might have been weakened by exposure and have fallen. Search was made for his fishing paraphernalia.

VAUGHAN CUTS BATTING LEAD OF OPPONENTS

Take it from Arky Vaughan, the National league batting crown won't be given up without a fight.

The heavy-hitter of the Pittsburgh Pirates is making that much clear by his stickwork these days.

Slow to start, Vaughan has come along fast at the plate in the last four weeks, has pulled up 38 percentage points in batting than 21 days, and is now batting just a shade under the 300 mark.

Of course, that's still far off the 385 mark he posted last year to win the title. But consider his steady, uninterrupted rise since mid-May, while most of the leaders have been falling off sharply, now that the heat is on. Consider, also, that he has been hitting better than 385 since before June 1.

Vaughan hit in his 19th straight game yesterday, getting three singles in five times up to set the pace as the Bucs collected 18 hits and clubbed the Phillies 6-2.

The victory left the Pirates just one percentage point off third place in the National league standings, since the Chicago Cubs nosed out the Phillies 4-3 behind Curt Davis' tight pitching to maintain their advantage.

The Cardinals continued to lead the pack, downing the second place New York Giants 6-3, as Dizzy Dean, the top big-league pitcher, chalked up his 11th win, taking the mound with 48 hours' rest.

Nesting Islands Planned for Wild Fowl at Klamath

Klamath Falls, Ore., June 8 (AP)—The biological survey CCC camp at Dry Lake will build nesting grounds for waterfowl which visit Upper Klamath. Clear and Tule lake, Camp Superintendent Clark Fenster said today.

Plans call for construction of several nesting islands in the Tule lake region, prior to the release of water from the lake over additional hundreds of acres of land next year. The island will be raised to a height of eight feet and will cover ground space of 80 by 100 feet in size.

Willows and poplar trees at the biological survey headquarters will be transplanted to the islands along with tule shoots.

MONOPOLY FOR PIN BALL AIM

Monmouth—N. J. Arnold of Salem would like a monopoly of pin-ball games in Monmouth. At the council meeting a written proposal was received from him in which he offered \$75 annually for the privilege, promising to keep six games in operation with a rental of \$15 a quarter or which figures \$3 a month or \$40 a year each, or a grand total for the six and the monopoly privilege of \$435 a year. The communication was referred to a committee.

A sewer cleaning machine company which recently completed a demonstration on the East street sewer, put in a proposal for service or purchase of a machine. The machine is a sort of corkscrew affair at the end of jointed rods. It seems a most common cause of sewer stoppage comes from roots of trees. In the experiment the machine took out roots three and four feet long and six inches across.

The city has received its loan money for the sewer extension, \$12,000, dated January 1st. Accrued interest, \$190, came with it. The grant money has not been received. Verd Schunk, chief of police, was given a leave of absence to attend a police school in Portland. The fire department was allowed \$10 expenses for one man to go to Marshfield to attend a fireman's school.

Troeh broke 240 targets out of 350 to win the all-around championship, shot a perfect 100 in the telegraphic shoot and took the doubles and singles events. Portland and Eugene placed first and second in team competition. Salem was chosen as the site for the 1937 tournament.

Medica, representing the Washington Athletic club's swimming team which piled up 63 points, won the 100 meter free style, the 300 meter free style, placed third in the 100 meter backstroke and was on winning medley relay teams. Multnomah club, Portland was second in club competition with 40 points.

Woodburn beat Bend 8 to 7 and Eugene downed Albany 4 to 2 in the State baseball league yesterday. The Toledo-Salem game to decide the leadership of the circuit was rained out.

TROEH WINNER LA GRANDE MEET

La Grande, Ore., June 8 (AP)—Through the reverberating echoes of the Oregon state trapshoot, Frank M. Troeh of Portland emerged today as the state's best pigeon cracker.

He won the Oregon all-around championship with a score of 340 out of a possible 350, and scored a perfect 100 to pace the Portland five-man squad to victory yesterday in the Oregonian telegraphic shoot. His other triumphs were in the doubles event Saturday and the singles yesterday.

The Portland team cracked 480 of a possible 500 targets to win the team shoot. Eugene's team was second with a score of 477, followed by Bend with 470, Corvallis 468, Tillamook 467, Salem 466, Klamath 465, Heppner-Eliot Rock 464, Medford 464 and La Grande 458.

The 1937 state tournament will be at Salem. It was decided at the annual business meeting.

In winning the singles event, Troeh was forced to shoot off against Tom Carpenter of Monroe and O. G. Hiltbrand of Wasco after all finished with scores of 197. Troeh broke 25 targets in the shoot-off while Hiltbrand went out on 24 and Carpenter on 22.

Troeh scored 96 from 24 yards to win the handicap. C. A. Dunn and W. E. Fisher each scored 95, with Dunn winning the shoot-off.
