He stated that he would endeavor to retain the present tenants which include the publishing plant of the Appeal-Tribune in the basement, the E. E. Taylor barber shop on the Water street entrance and the Dr. Wrightman surgery and office rooms as well as living apartments in the upper story. The main building that was occupied by the banking firm till August, 1933, has had no occupants excepting the receivers and assistants during the four years. This will undergo changes to meet the needs of renters that will soon be in possession though definite announcements are not made as to who the new tenants will be.

Steelhammer said that he had no intention of moving into the new property as his place of business, as had been rumored, but will continue his drug store at the present site where he has been for more than 25 years.

Until the work of the receiver, C. C. Bryant of Albany, is completed, a portion of the main building will be retained for their convenience.

JAIL ESCAPED UPON PROMISE TO KEEP SOBER

Woodburn—Fred Newman, arrested for driving a motor vehicle while intoxicated, entered a plea of guilty in Judge Overton's court by his attorney James M. Green and was given a fine of \$100, plus costs of \$3.35 and sentenced to 90 days in the county jail. The jail sentence was suspended on condition that he be not convicted within a year of being intoxicated in a public place or on a public highway or for driving a motor vehicle illegally, and that the fine and costs be paid within 10 days. His license to drive is automatically revoked for one year. The suspension of the jail sentence was made for the reason that the defendant is a farmer and has crops that need his attention.

The case of Delbert Allen Randall, charged with driving while intoxicated, which was to have been tried June 9, was postponed at the request of the defendant's attorney who was unable to be present due to other cases.

The trial of Peter Nick Kurth, charged with transporting property in a truck without PUC license plates, was also postponed from June 9 to a later date.

Robert Thomas Hess, Jr., paid a fine of \$5 and costs of \$2.50 for driving his truck at a speed of 45 miles per hour after pleading guilty to the charge. Lester Joseph Ray paid the same amount for driving a truck 43 miles per hour and Julius Johnny Peterson also paid the same amount for driving a truck at a speed of 45 miles per hour.

Albert Linn Lawson entered a plea of guilty to driving his car with four people in the driver's seat and paid a fine of \$5 and costs of \$2.50.
