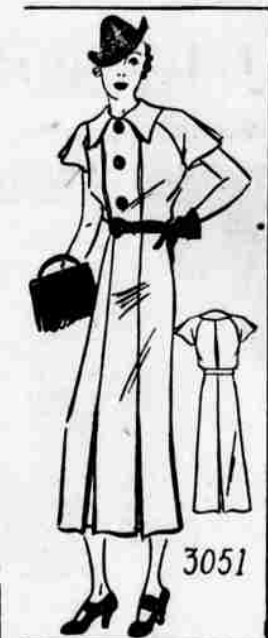

NO WARDROBE is complete without a tailored shirtwaist frock — and the one shown here is in the latest fashion and is both easy to make and easy to keep fresh. In a season when inverted pleats are widely used to achieve classic silhouette lines with ample freedom for active wear, this frock uses the pleats both above and below the waistline in smartly tailored effect. Bosom pleats extend from the raglan shoulder line to the waist, and the line carries down each side in a seamline that opens into another inverted pleat in the skirt. The action back has a center pleat and a center seam with another inverted pleat in the skirt. The boyish high collar, cut with points at the front, and the capelet effect sleeves finished with an inverted pleat at the top are other important details. The model pictured is made in one of the new novelty dot prints that are so popular this spring. This one uses irregularly spaced broken dots of white or white rimmed with aqua against a dark background, in inexpensive smooth rayon crepe that is washable and seamproof.

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Hay Fever Cure Simple Says Doctor

MOST of us are sure of only two things—death and taxes, but the patient with hay fever may be fairly sure of something else, and that is the date when his next attack will begin. One of the strangest things about hay fever is that after it once develops, it has a remarkable tendency to return at the same time, year after year. In fact, many hay fever sufferers can tell the exact date when the attacks will start.

Most of the attacks come on during the late spring, summer and fall, although in some cases the attacks continue throughout the entire year. Hay fever appears to run in families, giving rise to the theory that it is inherited. However, instead of the disease itself being inherited, it is only the tendency which is passed on to the children. If both the mother and father are hay fever victims, then 80 percent of their children will develop hay fever before they are 12 years old. It has been pointed out that hay fever might be controlled by preventing the marriage of people susceptible to it, but even the doctor making the suggestion realized that very few hay fever patients would want to follow his advice.

Some of the common names for hay fever are hay asthma, summer catarrh and rose fever. The symptoms of the disease resemble those of the common cold. The eyes become red, the nose feels full and congested, and the patient has attacks of violent sneezing. The eyes water and itch and there is a profuse, watery discharge from the nose which necessitates the frequent use of the handkerchief.

For many centuries the cause which produced the seasonal return of the attacks was not understood. However, by 1856 it had been proved that the pollen from hay had the power to produce the attacks in susceptible individuals. Later on, the pollen from golden rod, rag weed, roses and also other substances such as fur, feathers, the orris root found in face powders, and many other substances were found to provoke the attacks in certain instances.

Finally, it was discovered that these substances induce hay fever in some people and not in others, simply because some individuals are allergic, that is, they have developed an abnormal sensitiveness to whatever substance affects them. An allergic individual has only to breathe the substance to which he is sensitive, and a typical attack of hay fever then follows, while an ordinary individual who is not susceptible can breathe the offending substance with no attack whatever.

In overcoming hay fever, the essential point is to overcome the patient's tendency toward an abnormal reaction and to return him to the state of immunity enjoyed by others. I feel sure that the important point is not so much to keep the patient away from pollens or other substances to which he is sensitive as it is to remove as far as possible the underlying systemic causes which make the substance irritating to him. With a treatment based on this theory, I have been able to secure excellent results in banishing hay fever.

It makes very little difference how long the patient has suffered from hay fever; if he will use the correct treatment to remove the basic causes he will be pleased to find that he may be near golden rod, rag weed, or any other substance which has previously affected him, remaining at the same time, absolutely free from hay fever.

The model is fashioned of white silk sprinkled with green, yellow and blue leaves and trimmed with a contrasting collar and cuff set. A slender paneled skirt is slit up the front to show a bit of white that gives a redingote effect while a row of buttons from the hipline to the collar decorate the front bodice. Note the three-quarter sleeves gathered into fitted cuffs and the novelty shoulder and hip yoke that decreases width, and adds veritable inches to your height. 1805-B—What could prove a happier choice for spectator sports wear than this slenderizing model for clubwomen and matrons.

All the details of this dress are so clearly revealed that little remains to recommend except to call attention to the sleeves. You may have long or short sleeves as you prefer, to emphasize the combination of smart styling and general use of the frock. The double

rever effect is handled remarkably well with the vestee in contrast, print or plaid.

Five Star pattern No. 1805-B is available in sizes 34, 36, 38, 40, 42 and 44. Size 36 requires 4 1/2 yards of 39 inch material plus 2-3 for contrast.

1848-B—From the snappy Johnny collar to the peppy action pleats there's a "going places to do things" look about this smart sports frock.

The dress has a smooth flattering collar opening from the waist and lapping over a becoming square yoke, a tailored effect without sacrificing feminine charm or gracefulness of line. If you go in for active sports you'll like the unhindering pleated sleeves and inverted center pleats for lots of knee action. Sports silk, pique, jersey or seersucker are appropriate materials, and you'll be more than pleased with the result. Five Star pattern No. 1848-B is available in sizes 14, 16, 18, 20; 40, 42 and 44. Corresponding bust measurements 32, 34, 36, 38, 40, 42 and 44. Size 16 (34) requires 3 1/2 yards of 39 inch material.

1866-B—Half the fun of outdoor sports, whether spectator or

active, consists in being appropriately attired.

Perfect tailored lines mark this smart and jaunty suit. The lovely jacket is gay in construction and hugs the figure slimly and flatteringly. For decorative reasons it has large link buttons at the center and two more on the sleeves. For a distinctive effect, wear the jacket with a contrasting skirt or checked tweed. The very simple but roomy skirt may also be worn on the "links" with a topping sweater or sports blouse. Select silk suiting, linen, tweed wools and cotton suitings for versatility and durability. Five Star pattern No. 1866-B is available in sizes 32, 34, 36, 38, 40 and 42. Size 34 requires 4 1/2 yards of 39 inch material.

1831-B is a slenderizing redingote for larger figures.

Regardless of how generous your figure, you can look chic, smart and well-proportioned in this slenderizing redingote frock.

You'll find the gracefully draping cascade jabot collar a flattering frame for your face and reveal in the height giving lines of the slim printed gore. You will enjoy its smooth fit and stylish flare. Another stunning feature is the dart fitted back and swaggy lap-over belt. The dress advocates

short sleeves, but if you prefer, use the full bishop sleeve tightened at the wrist.

Native Tribes of South Australia Shun "Taboo" Caves of Mystery

A "TABOO" country is the great Nullarbor Plain—a treeless waste covering 38,000 square miles in South Australia. Native tribes shun it, and whites have not ventured into it until recently. Exploring parties have made many attempts to solve its hidden secrets, but have failed.

A few months ago Captain Thomson, harbor master of Port Lincoln, struck into the limestone area with eight companions. He found the vast area pitted with blowholes, deep pits from ancient lava flows — and discovered a curious vertical shaft dropping into the earth. They lowered a ladder, climbed down into a huge underground chamber. Flashing pet-

rol lamps, they saw a hole through which they crawled on hands and knees. Suddenly an enormous well appeared — almost swallowed them.

At the well's edge was a great footprint — no other sign of human habitation. Following an obscure tunnel, they came to an underground lake and other caves. In one of these was the red imprint of a man's hand on the wall — the warning symbol of the "Bloody Hand."

Archaeologists believe these vast grottoes have hidden the ancient ritualistic practices of the old Australian tribes, their churinga stones and other emblems of prehistoric superstitions.

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
