Albany—More than 150 young people are expected to have registered at the Mennonite Young People's Institute, which opened at the Fairview Mennonite church here Friday and will continue throughout the week-end. This institute is the first of its kind to be held in the Mennonite conference district. It is being conducted prior to the annual conference of Mennonite churches, comprising churches in Idaho, Oregon and California, which will be held for four days starting next Monday.

### National Recognition Is Offered Silverton Hybridizer of Irises

Silverton—Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge of Silverton is listed in the June "The Flower Garden," a garden magazine published by H. B. Lyon company of Albany, N. Y., as one of the four famous iris hybridizers of the nation. The article is by Thurlow Weed and places Dr. Kleinsorge with L. Merton Case of Natick, Mass., Sydney B. Mitchell of California and Clint McDade of Chattanooga, Tenn.

The story reads: "Traveling six hundred miles northward, I came to the garden of Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge of Silverton, Oregon. Having seen some of Dr. Kleinsorge's beautiful originalizations in bloom, I desired to meet this famous hybridizer. He appeared delighted to see me and left his patients to suffer while showing me around his experimental garden. I recognized his fine originalizations, Oregon Beauty, Klamath and Oregon Giant, but he was forced to name the other attractive specimens. These turned out to be Me-hama, a blend of pink and yellow; Itasca, a violet self; Kalinga, a pale luminous cream; Anakin, an extremely large bright blue, and Mountain Sunset, a beautiful blend showing colors like a sunset in the deep mountains. The finest bloom stalk in his garden was his 1936 introduction, Par West, a seedling of tan, gold and blue.

"How, and when, did you become interested in hybridizing?" I asked, watching him take the pollen from the stamens of Par West and place it on the stigmas of Kalinga so that a seed pod would later form.

"About fifteen years ago," he replied, as he fastened a tag giving the cross on the bloom stalk. "I obtained some of the finest varieties then available, but was not satisfied."

### REDUCTION SET UPON FRANCHISE FOR POWER LINE

Corvallis—The proposed electric company franchise between the city and the Mountain States Power company, which has recently been referred to the state public utilities commissioner for examination, is designed to replace the franchise which was granted when electricity was almost in its infancy—in 1906.

The present franchise, which has passed the first and second readings of the city council and has been published the required two times, will be for only 20 years instead of the old period of 30 years granted in the earlier document.
