

HADLEY STAYS WITH POST AT MORE SALARY

Newberg, June 13.—By the unanimous action of Oregon Yearly Meeting of the Friends church in its 44th annual session, the recommendation of the executive council was adopted continuing Chester A. Hadley of Portland as general superintendent of Yearly Meeting, at an advance of \$300 in salary. The Yearly Meeting has been particularly gratified at the advance made during the past year.

Professor Oliver Weesner of Pacific college has been re-elected as president of the evangelistic and church extension board, following the report of this board and the presentation to the meeting of a number of leaders in the outpost work.

Zenas Perisho reported on the work at East Bench meeting near Vale. Marjorie Votaw reported on the work which she and Wendell Votaw are carrying on in a community 10 miles east of Newberg. Dillon Mills reported on the work at Woodland, Idaho; Myrtle Russell of Tacoma told of the work which she and Lewis Russell are carrying on in northeast Tacoma. Fred Baker gave a report on the work at Prunsville and Mount Pleasant, Wash., and Lyman Miles reported on the evangelistic work of the Workers' League during the past year.

The report of the missionary board occupied the meeting during the afternoon, with Joseph W. McCracken of Scotts Mills presiding. This work in Bolivia has grown in six years from a single native worker to six missionaries from the United States and four full time native workers.

The subject of peace, which is very dear to the hearts of Quakers, was presented in the forenoon session through the report of the peace superintendent, President Levi T. Pennington of Pacific college at Newberg, and of the service superintendent, Ward L. Haines of Portland. This showed a large amount of work of many different varieties during the year, with special stress on the work of the emergency peace campaign and the effort to have military training made optional instead of compulsory at the state university and state college.

Following the report, brief addresses were given by three men who had been in army camps as conscientious objectors during the World war, and who had had some very interesting experiences which they told in the Yearly Meeting. These men were Ward L. Haines and Harold P. Mills of Portland, and H. Paul Michener of Newberg.

Paul H. Elliott, executive secretary of the Pacific Northwest conference on International Relations, spoke briefly to the meeting, especially emphasizing the importance of the petition for non-compulsory military training in colleges. He showed the growth of the R.O.T.C. from 57 in 1913, with 85 officers, to 399 in 20 years later with 1658 such officers, and told of the number of instances where students had been expelled because they would not take military training.

Joseph W. Reece, pastor of the First Friends church of Portland, was named as presiding clerk for the meeting on ministry and oversight. This body acted favorably on the proposals for the recording as ministers of L. Esther Hendrick of Seattle, J. Edward Baker of Newberg and Richard H. Brown of Salem.

The report of the statistician showed a total membership for the year of 3112, as compared with 3187 last year. Only 2186 of the total are resident members.

The treasurer's report showed a total disbursement from the treasury during the past year of \$9682.94, nearly half of which was for foreign missions. The voluntary united budget for the coming year is \$6735; \$4900 for foreign missions and \$2500 for the evangelistic and church extension board. This is in addition to the budget of fixed expense.

Model Mill Village

Plainfield, Conn. (UP)—This town, regarded not so long ago as Connecticut's model mill village, today faces abandonment, as a result of lethal blows dealt by a strike at the town's only factory, the large Lawton Mills, and the consequent placing of that plant upon the auction block.

Theaters and stores have closed, and the \$1,000,000 community house and grounds, a beautiful athletic plant, presented to the town by a wealthy benefactor, are now closed to the public and harbor state policemen.

Tent City Plan for Centennial Crowds

Dallas (UP)—A tent city, capable of housing 1,000 centennial visitors, will be erected near the Texas Centennial exposition grounds, according to plans by Dr. W. E. Martin, of Dallas.

The "canvases" city will be situated only two blocks from the exposition grounds, with nearly 300 tents. All tents will be provided with electric lights. A bathhouse will be built with showers and restrooms, graveled walks and drives and drinking fountains along the tent village streets.

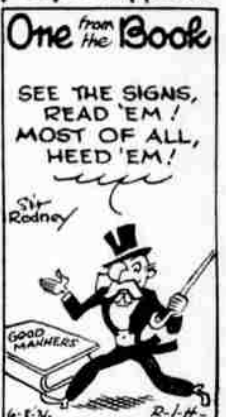

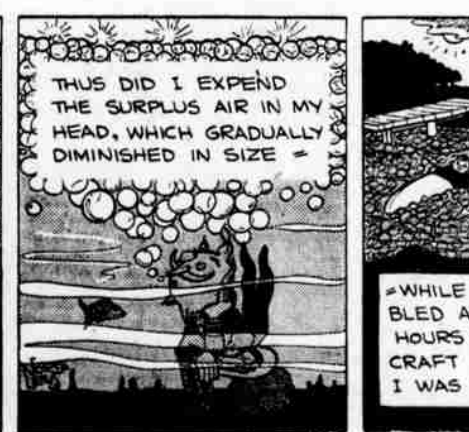

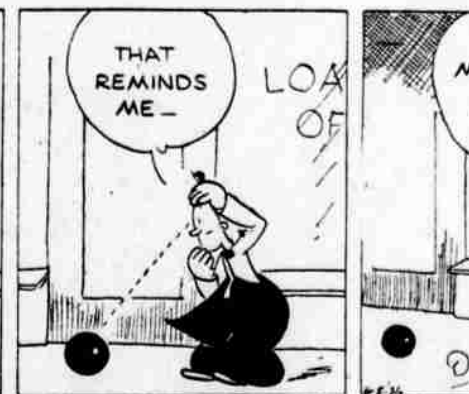
