

SHERIDAN PEOPLE PAY HONOR TO ITS FOUNDER

PIONEER TIMES ARE ACTED OUT IN BIG PARADE

Sheridan—The parade which started the second annual Phil Sheridan day Saturday far surpassed that of last year as did all events of the day. Chairman Bates and his committee kept the big crowd satisfied from 10:30 until late at night at the big free dance in the American Legion hall.

Mrs. Olive Waugeman, as Queen Olive I, senior queen, and little Lucille Hare, as Queen Lucille I, junior queen, attended by their princesses, including Mrs. Rose Beckwith, Mrs. E. L. Sechrist, Mrs. Mary Tilden and Mrs. Laura Brown, Peggy Ivis, Alice Fulham, Delores Krieger, Patricia Lutrope, Anna Mae Davison, Ruth Hintzen and Patricia Thompson, rode in state down Bridge and Highway streets to the city park.

General Phil Sheridan, on his black charger, guided the line of march. He was followed by his retinue of officers, all in the regalia of 1861. Pioneers of the early days of Sheridan and relics of the days of the pioneers were all in the parade. When the parade reached the city park Queen Olive was crowned with all due ceremonies by Mayor Ed Bayliss who bestowed the coronation amidst the cheers of the big crowd.

After the coronation Walter R. May of Portland gave the address of the day. Music was furnished by the East Creek Farmers' Union band. The noon-day event was the basket dinner, and sports occupied the afternoon, beginning at 2:30 and continuing until after 4:30 o'clock.

Mrs. Waugeman was born at The Dalles in 1881, and her family moved to Sheridan when she was four years old. Her parents were Marcellus and Caroline Faulconer, one of Sheridan's pioneer families, and she has seen Sheridan grow from a small settlement on the north side of the bridge into the prosperous city it now is. Her father bought the land and built their first home where the business section on the north side of town now is. Mrs. Waugeman recalls the first store in Sheridan. Her uncle, Thomas Faulconer, and her father started a general merchandise store soon after the first store was started.

STAYTON FINDS SCHOOL TAXES IN GOOD SHAPE

Stayton—The annual school meeting of school district No. 77 of Marion and Linn counties was held in the high school auditorium Monday at 2 o'clock.

The budget as prepared by the budget committee including Dr. H. A. Beauchamp, George Keech, J. F. Richards and Geo. E. Duncan and Andrew Fery and Grant Murphy, school board members, and Paul Stayton, clerk, submitted an estimated budget as follows:

Total estimated receipts, \$7,225, and total estimated expenditures for year, \$15,167.50. Cash balance at the beginning of the year was \$5,558, and closed with \$5,867. There is no warranted indebtedness in the district. There is an \$8,500 bonded indebtedness outstanding that cannot be retired except as provided by the bonds at \$1,000 per year. Taxes collected exceeded the levy by \$699, which indicates that all taxes are gradually being caught up.

Thirty-eight votes were cast on the adoption of the budget, with 37 yes and one blank.

In the election of a director Dr. H. A. Beauchamp and Ward Ingles were nominated. Forty-two votes were cast with Dr. Beauchamp receiving 24 and Ingles 18. Paul Stayton was re-elected clerk with all 40 votes cast for him. Dr. H. A. Beauchamp, chairman of the school board, presided.

SCHOOL RACE IS HOT ONE

Corvallis—W. J. Chamberlain and T. J. Starker were victorious over their opponents, E. B. Lemon and H. M. Lehnert, Monday in one of the most sensational school board elections seen in Corvallis for many years. Over fifteen hundred citizens voted, making it the second largest vote ever cast in a school election.

The two directors were elected for a three-year term each. Four men in the race made interest in the outcome very high, so the large voting was anticipated. Also, the stand taken by the two who were elected on the issue of whether to erect a new armory in the sight of the old junior high school grounds, was favorable to their election. The two men elected were in favor of the new armory, which will be built partly from PWA funds, while those defeated did not commit themselves on the issue.

Mr. Lemon was the only one out of the four running who has served on the board before, having just completed his term as chairman.

MEMBERSHIP DRIVE STARTED BY WOMEN

Corvallis—A membership drive for Pro America started in Corvallis Monday, with two teams heading the activity. Mrs. Fred McHenry and Mrs. Myron K. Myers are captaining the teams.

CAREY CHOSEN SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER, SCIO

Scio—F. G. Carey was elected by acclamation to serve on the school board of Scio district No. 95 for the ensuing three-year term at the regular annual meeting at the high school auditorium in Scio Monday. J. P. Wesely was re-elected clerk of the district. O. A. Hall, senior member of the board, will be chairman for the ensuing year, filling the vacancy left by J. D. Denmore, Jr., retiring chairman. W. Z. Sims is the other board member.

Report of the 1935-36 school year was read by Clerk J. P. Wesely. Receipts received during the term totaled \$11,434.41, itemized as follows: Balance on hand \$538.29; district tax, \$3,371.06; county fund, \$1,026.50; elementary fund, \$1,519.50; non-uniform high school fund, \$3,188.25; transportation, \$262.42; interest on warrants due to district No. 95, \$60.24; tuition and transportation from districts 1 and 83, \$1,431.85; other sources, \$57.

Disbursements during the year, according to the clerk, were \$11,434.31, items being old warrants, \$3,716.02; interest on same, \$106.04; new warrants, \$7,433.10; interest on same, \$143.58; balance in bank, \$35.57.

Cost of operating the school, both grade and high, of district No. 95, for the year 1935-36 was \$10,727.06. Costs included in this department were:

Clerk, \$75; interest, \$249.62; advertising, \$32.87; teachers, \$7,069.95; supplies, \$270.64; books, \$166.15; janitor, \$363; janitor's supplies, \$73.61; wood, \$156.25; lights, \$124.20; water, \$63.13; repairs to furniture and equipment, \$400.22; health, \$53.59; bus drivers, \$450; gas oil and repairs for buses, \$708.63; bus insurance, \$156.75; building insurance, \$212.50; new furniture and equipment, \$100.95.

Accounts to be received for 1936 will total \$4847.37, according to the clerk's estimates. Money from delinquent taxes within the district has not been ascertained. Unpaid warrants of \$3,191.32 are expected to be wiped off the district books within the coming year. The present outstanding warrants are the only ones remaining from a debt of \$12,827.31 in 1933.

Uproar Follows Effort of Girl To Mail Letter

Albany—Shirley Sherwood, who is eight years old and lives at Sweet Home, essayed to mail a letter at First and Ellsworth streets Monday, but she did not intend to ask the Albany fire department to help her. So when Shirley heard the sound of fire sirens as she attempted to assert the letter into fire alarm box No. 5 she was startled to learn.

The little girl was standing at the intersection, crying from fright, as the big red fire truck arrived. The fire chief learned that the girl, visiting in Albany today with her mother, had inquired where she might mail the letter. She was directed, the chief learned, to First and Ellsworth streets, but she went to the wrong corner. The result was a false general alarm.

HEAVY VOTE CAST IN SCHOOL BALLOT

Silverton—As a result of the largest vote in the history of the district, H. B. Jorgenson and Dr. William MacNeill were elected to membership on the Silverton school board Monday. The total vote was 669. Jorgenson topped the field with 396, while MacNeill placed second with 423. H. W. Preston, third man in the race, polled 259 while one ballot was cast for Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge. Four were thrown out, being defective.

Retiring members of the board are H. R. Irish who has served 11 years, and Merlin Conran, six years. Holdover directors are W. P. Scarth, Lee Alfred and Oscar Lee.

GUARD TROOPS OFF FOR CAMP
