

LEGION WADING POOL LAUNCHED AT CORVALLIS

Corvallis—Construction of a wading pool for children was started Wednesday by the American Legion under the direction of Charles Wiley. The pool is being built in the extreme northwest corner of the city park along Mary's river.

The pool will be made of cement and will be laid at the upper end of the park. It will be circular in shape, with a 20-foot diameter and will vary in depth from four inches along the edges to 14 in the center.

Money for the materials in the new pool is being provided by the American Legion auxiliary as its own particular project, and the labor for its construction is being provided by members of the local American Legion pool.

The project has been planned for some time, but is just now getting started. It is hoped it will be completed and ready for use in about two weeks, with members of the Legion working in nightly shifts to do the work.

The location of the pool is in line with the plans drawn up by F. A. Outhbert, a former Oregon State college landscape architect, several years ago and will carry out the ideas for improvement of the city park.

The auxiliary has been planning to have the pool in this location for the past two years and has been busy landscaping the location. Shrubs which have been planted are now grown and the members of the auxiliary will keep up the surroundings of the pool which will be encircled by a five-foot cement walk.

Use of the pool will be free to Corvallis children when it is completed.

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HARTLEY CLAN REUNION HELD ON OLD CLAIM

The 74th birthday anniversary of Edgar Hartley, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Hartley, who crossed the plains in pioneer days and settled on the Hartley donation land claim, was also celebrated. The large birthday cake was baked by Mrs. Edith Wilson.

In the afternoon a short program was given and many old relics were shown. Numbers on the program were: Talk by John P. Davis in which he paid tribute to the memory of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Hartley and other early pioneers; talk by W. J. Lehman, R. W. Dwyer, Edgar Hartley and William Lehman, and readings by J. F. C. Teckenberg and Loraine Patterson.

Among the relics displayed by Mrs. J. F. C. Teckenberg was a mail sent by her mother with her mother also spinning and coloring the yarn; a huge chest which was brought across the plains in an ox wagon and a Dutch oven in which Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Hartley (Ann Eliza Whitman) cooked their first meal after they were married in 1847. The oven was old then, having been brought from England some time before. Other relics shown by Mrs. Teckenberg were an old spinning wheel, an ox yoke and the teakettle hung on a crane in the fireplace at one end of the dining room.

The remainder of the day was spent in viewing the Teckenberg gardens. The gardens are of interest because of their variety of blossoms and the age and origin of some of the flowers. The gardens are flanked on each side by rocks from the old Indian fort near the old Hartley place, and large boulders from this same fort are used as a fence for the lawn which is shaded by large maple trees.
