

HOLIDAY CELEBRATION WILL FOLLOW CONVENTION

STATE EAGLES LODGE SESSION PRELIMINARY

Silverton—Three or four days of the keener activity during the state convention of Eagles is not sufficient outlet for the exuberance of R. J. Baldwin and his managing committee of E.O.E., and an extension of celebrations is booked for over the Fourth. This will be the first local observance in a community way on the national holiday for many years.

Baldwin is announcing that plans for the celebration are progressing in fine shape and that he has his committeemen all lined up and raring to go.

The Eagles will leave the 25 five-flag streamers and the store-front decorations up until after the Fourth and with the asserted cooperation with the small near-by towns the affair is taking shape for one grand success.

Assisting Baldwin in a committee way are Captain Harry Riches in charge of the patriotic parade that will form at the Eugene Field grounds and march to the city park, starting at 9 o'clock Saturday morning.

George Custer, city police judge, is managing a patriotic program of speeches beginning at 11 o'clock at the city park.

Free coffee dispensed by Walter Morgan and his Boy Scouts will be an accompaniment to the basket dinner in the park served shortly after noon.

L. C. Eastman, sports chairman, assisted by O. L. Bonney, Ernie J. Boesch and Bob Scott, will start the games and contests in the park promptly at 1:30 o'clock with plenty of fun in store for the youngsters and adults. Boesch will supervise baseball games at the ball park on Eureka field at West Hill later in the afternoon. He also is arranging a softball game on the afternoon program, preceded by special sports contests on Eureka field.

Something vastly different and saving of the old-time races among on-foot firemen of former years will be at 6:30 o'clock in the afternoon in charge of Fred Caven-der, volunteer fire chief, when the Mt. Angel and Silverton departments will stage contests on the streets of down-town Silverton. Attractive swimming bouts and contests will be staged at 7 o'clock in the municipal pool at the park and immediately following the swimming an old-time fiddlers' contest will be in the park.

And "then came the fireworks" is next in order with Ernest R. Kkman, president of the local Eagleserie in charge, offering a remarkable display. Members of the Hill Fireworks company made a recent visit at the home town and offered suggestions for methods and places for the best effects in lighting.

E. A. Sewell will head a committee to put on a carnival dance at the armory in the evening.

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FLAMES CLAIM ALBANY HOUSE CASE IS LOST

Albany—Flames early Thursday destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Finch at 15th and Elm streets and all of its contents. Mr. and Mrs. Finch and small child were out-of-doors when they discovered the fire. The fire department was called but only after the house had been nearly burned to the ground. The Finch home was covered by a total of \$850 insurance. Cause of the fire was not learned.

Incidental damage was done by the flames to the Mountain States Power company's primary line above the house, carrying 11,000 volts. The wires had snapped when the firemen had arrived, but the power on that circuit was shut off before any harm resulted. Higher up the poles the main trunk line carrying 66,000 volts escaped damage.

DAMAGES DENIED

Albany—A circuit court jury brought in a verdict in favor of the defendant in the case of Clara Hickam of Salem vs. Walter Stuart of Albany, in which the plaintiff was seeking \$10,250 damages for injuries which she declared she sustained in an automobile accident in Albany December 26, 1934. The case was opened Wednesday and the jury received the complete evidence Thursday afternoon. After a short deliberation the verdict was handed to Judge L. H. McMahon.

HOME ECON HAS CAMPUS SCHOOL

Corvallis—The annual conference of high school teachers of home economics, sponsored by the state board of vocational education, is completing a record meeting on the campus this week with an average attendance of more than 50, reports Miss Bertha Kohlner, state supervisor of home economics instruction.

Most of the conference this week has been directed toward interpreting the results of the comprehensive study of the home activities of Oregon high school girls. Miss Beulah Coon, special agent in research study from Washington, D. C., office of education, has been assisting in this work. From the results of the conference this week, it is hoped the high school teaching program can be still more closely adapted to actual home conditions and needs of students.

Other special guests of the week assisting with the program included Dora B. Lewis of Washington, D. C., special agent for the 11 western states, and Mrs. C. W. Robinson of Portland, recently appointed by the governor as a member of the state board of vocational education, representing homemaking.

The annual banquet was held at the Hotel Benton Thursday night honoring these special guests as well as Dean Ava B. Milan, and staff of the school of home economics.
