

SANTIAM SPREE CELEBRATION LASTS FIVE DAYS

STAYTON PLANS DEDICATION OF NEW CITY HALL

Stayton—Stayton was assured one of the outstanding programs of the state during the five-day celebration climaxed by the dedication of the city hall July 14 to 18 with the acceptance of invitations by Senator Charles L. McNary, Governor Charles H. Martin and Secretary Earl Snell.

These three officials will speak on the dedication program Saturday afternoon when the city of Stayton formally receives the new structure from the WPA officials. State officials of the WPA and the state fire marshal also have accepted invitations to attend.

The ceremonies have been scheduled for 2 o'clock following the big parade Saturday morning. Sport contests have been arranged for later in the afternoon.

The browning shows, will move on to the midway on Main street Tuesday, July 14, and will include a full line of carnival attractions, concessions and free acts. A special lighting system is to be constructed to turn Main street into a white way for the five days' celebration.

Floral and marching units representing local business firms and many outside organizations are being arranged according to the members of the parade committee.

All kiddies throughout the Santiam valley are requested to communicate with members of the parade committee and enter the parade in the pet division of the big parade to be staged in conjunction with the Santiam spree. Each contestant will be awarded some kind of a prize.

Members of the committee are Floyd Crabtree, chairman, A. C. Van Nuy, W. A. Weddle and H. J. Rowe.

The parade will be divided into several classes and each class will participate for various prizes.

The first division will be assigned to manufacturers for which there will be an entrance fee of \$5. Three prizes have been posted for the winning entries.

The second class will be the automobile division with a \$5 entrance fee for the first car and \$1 for each additional automobile in any one exhibit. Two prizes will be awarded.

The merchants have been assigned to the third division for which there is an entrance fee of \$2.50 with two prizes awarded.

The fourth division will include the visiting fire trucks.

The fifth division will be the pet and come unit. No entrance fee is required for this division but prizes will be awarded.

Proceeds from the entrance fees will go to the local firemen's organization.

Nine girls representing seven communities in this sector are preparing to launch intensive campaigns for the honor of being crowned Miss Santiam, to rule during the five day Santiam spree.

The contest will culminate with the official crowning of the queen Thursday night at the formal queen's ball.

Miss Lenore Inglis, Miss Birdean Yeoman and Miss Minnie Rider are the three Stayton contestants. Miss Inglis' candidacy is being sponsored by the Women's community club.

Miss Yeoman by the business men and Miss Rider by the Paris Woolen mill. Miss Isabelle Riesters' name of Sublimity has been entered from that section. Other girls will be entered from Turner, Seila, Aumsville, West Stayton, Mehama and Lyons.

The maid, who is selected to rule supreme, will be accompanied by a royal court and will be accorded all the dignity of her position and will be welcomed at the dedication by U. S. Senator McNary, Governor Charles H. Martin and Secretary of State Earl Snell.

Mrs. Ethel P. Brown is a member of both families. Her paternal grandparents were John and Jane Crocker-Lemmon who came to Marion county settling in French Prairie in 1845 from Indiana, and her mother's father was Sampson Jones, an uncle to Bent Jones of Salem who recently passed away. The Jones family came to Oregon from Ohio in 1865 and settle on French Prairie.

The Crockers, of which Jane Crocker-Lemmon was a member, were prominent in their influence in promoting the work of the first trans-continental railway of the United States.

John Lemmon was head of the group that broke the trail from Oregon City to Portland, and his oldest daughter, Sarah Walden, as a bride, was the first pioneer woman to come into the Willamette valley by what was then termed the southern route by way of Sweet Home. Sampson Jones came this route also to aid in driving the cattle while the others of the train came down the Columbia by rail. Most of the cattle were lost in the mountains, however.

The late P. L. Brown, husband of Mrs. Ethel P. Brown, had compiled valuable data on these of the early pioneers and it is the intentions of the other members of the family to effect a publication. The work is of inestimable value to Oregon historians as Mr. Brown spent many years in accurate research.
