

SALEM MAN PRESIDENT STATE AERIE OF EAGLES

WARREN JONES GIVEN SEAT IN WARM CONTEST

Silverton—After a week filled with excitement culminating with the state convention of Eagles, Silverton relaxed over the week-end to get its breath before plunging into the celebration of the Fourth of July. Daylight Sunday found the last of the celebrants still on the streets.

Drawings for the goddess of liberty to take part in Fourth of July celebration resulted in Jerry Duncan, a brunet, getting the honor. Her princesses, both blondes, are Ruth Nelson and Marjorie Inman.

Balloting for state officers of the Eagles occupied the attention of delegates until nearly 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon with A. Warren Jones, Salem, state vice president, trailing A. H. Banwell, Medford, for state president until the last handful of ballots were counted which placed Jones in the chair to succeed B. H. Goldstein, of Portland, as president. Jones had a margin of 40 votes. Results of the election were announced at the dinner, transferred to the armory from the city park because of threatening weather. All new officers were installed by Dr. H. B. Mehrmann, of Oakland, Calif., national vice president. Astoria was selected 1937 convention city in a close race with Klamath Falls.

Other state officers are Charles Foster, Astoria, vice president; Robert Vorhees, Portland, secretary; Ralph Benrimm, Klamath Falls, treasurer; Dr. J. D. Rankin, Falls, inner guard; Perry Kitzmiller, Cascade Locks, outer guard; Arthur Baines, Portland, chaplain; Lay Troyer, Milton-Freewater, conductor; Jack Greenwood, Gresham, 3-year trustee; Don Lyon, Oregon City, 2-year trustee. Delegates to the national convention are Dr. Rankin and Goldstein.

Competition winners were also announced at the dinner. Gresham placed first in the Eagle drill team, with Marshfield second and Salem third. Marshfield was first in class "A" ritualistic work and Gresham second. Coquille won the "B" event. Marshfield also won first for the women's fancy drill contest with Coquille second. Oregon City placed first for class "A" ritualistic work and Marshfield second with Klamath Falls winning the class "B" contest.

Convention resolutions occupied the delegates during the Saturday morning session with ballots passed out shortly before 1 o'clock. A recess was taken during the parade which occurred a little after 2 o'clock during intermittent showers.

Though preparations had been made for nearly 40 guests for breakfast at the Silverton Hills community hall, less than 75 attended the meal which was served after an early morning trip to the Silver Falls state park.

CONVENTION RESOLUTIONS COVER MANY SUBJECTS AT STATE EAGLES GATHERING

Silverton—Indicative of the work being done by the Eagles of the state were the more than 40 resolutions passed during the three day convention which ended Saturday night at Silverton. This was done by a committee of three, assisted by the three members of the distribution committee.

These suggested among other things, a positive legislative plan for old age pensions; assistance with milk funds for undernourished children; concerning contract doctors for industrial organizations to be of the highest type of physicians; lauding the Clackamas planning board in admitting to WPA rolls other than those on relief from May to November of last year; endorsing the Seattle and San Diego authorities for their stand on highway safety devices; to bring about strict representative type of state aerie government with a board to meet in January to execute necessary business from then till the time of the June state convention; several resolutions expressing appreciation of the cooperation of newspapers, committees, towns, and especially H. J. Lange, state publicity chairman, for outstanding efforts to make the convention a success; unfavorable report on the socialized medicine resolution; public "condemnation of all communism and all kindred theories which advocate the overthrow of our American constitution"; create a fund for sending cripple children to Portland for medical treatment; and a recommendation by the resolutions committee that the one concerning workmen's compensation be referred to a committee for investigation appointed by the incoming president, demanding that "injured workmen's money used for building state office buildings at Salem be returned to the state industrial accident commission by the legislature of Oregon and that present practice of building up a fund of more than \$2,000,000 to be loaned to banks be discontinued and money be expended for benefit of working men of the state and their widows and orphans."

The "harmony program" inaugurated by the grand vice-president, Dr. H. B. Mehrmann of Oakland, Calif., to eliminate territorial factions of the state aerie, came to naught after an all night battle. E. H. Goldstein, retiring president, was successful in gaining the approval of the convention in his plan of only one year's term to a state president.

Resolutions committee includes G. W. Mason, Portland; A. Walter Norblad, Astoria, and Jack Greenwood, Gresham. On distribution are Dr. J. D. Rankin, Coquille; Roy Taves, Oregon City, and G. W. Fetzer, The Dalles.

Among the resolutions adopted at the state convention by the auxiliary members was the inauguration of a local birthday party to create funds wherewith the state president might make visitation trips to each auxiliary during the year. A cash resolution provided for cash prizes to be given from the state organization to women's fancy drill teams.

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
