JOHN NAG FREE OF DOG KILLING CASE IN COURT

Woodburn—After a jury trial in Judge Overton's court John Nag was found not guilty of the crime of killing R. M. Collier's dog with his car and failing to stop after the accident. His trial was held Saturday and the jury was composed of R. H. Scott, L. C. Blust, S. A. Hoefler, Carl Erickson, E. J. Allen and E. H. Scholes with Albert Reiling and S. W. Maupin as alternates.

Joe Felton, deputy district attorney, appeared for the state and W. D. Harris of Mt. Angel appeared for the defendant. Witnesses were Collier and Roy Manning in behalf of the state, the defendant appearing on his own behalf. Nag did not deny killing the dog but stated that he did not know he had hit the dog at the time and therefore did not stop. The accident occurred on the Aurora-Donald highway.

Charlie Gustav Berg of Portland, arrested for reckless driving, appeared Monday and entered a plea of guilty. The warrant for his arrest was issued May 23 and his offense was committed May 11 by driving in a serpentine line along the pavement. He was fined \$25 and costs and failing to pay was committed to the county jail.

For driving his truck at a speed of 45 miles per hour Keith Stump paid a fine of \$10 and costs of \$2.50. Arvid Albert Thumberg paid \$5 and costs of \$2.50 for driving a truck without license plates.

Wingo Reese Eggleston, arrested for driving his truck at a speed of 47 miles per hour, entered a plea of guilty and paid a fine of \$5 and costs of \$2.50.
