

ROAD PROJECTS AUTHORIZED BY COUNCIL VOTE

Scio—Approximately \$700 will be expended in the near future for surfacing of portions of Mill, Wheeler, Smith and North streets, all on the north side of Thomas creek in Scio. It was voted by the city council in monthly session at the city hall.

Oiling and graveling, three complete coats, will be done by Linn county equipment and labor. Streets on the south side of the creek will be surfaced when funds permit, the council decided.

South Main street and east Water street have already been surfaced by the state highway department.

A bill of \$463.36 from the Crane company, Portland, for water mains and fittings, was laid on the table pending checking of material on the ground and ordering of additional pipes.

About 100 feet of 6-inch cast iron water mains will be ordered to supply crossing at Main and Wheeler streets at Mill.

Councilman O. F. Bryan reported that a new outside electric switch had been installed at the city hall. Contract bills for water and power were allowed as were minor labor and supply bills. A bill of \$99.84 from the Consolidated Supply company, Portland, for two hydrants and fittings was ordered paid.

Councilman W. P. Gill, N. I. Morrison, and O. F. Bryan, ordinance committee, were instructed to prepare an ordinance prohibiting clearing of tractors from passing over surfaced streets within the city limits.
