

DECKS CLEARED FOR ACTION IN OLYMPIC TRIALS

3000 ATHLETES WILL COMPETE FOR 60 PLACES

New York, July 6 (AP)—With the athletic decks cleared for decisive action, it's possible today to offer a fairly accurate line on who's who and what's likely to happen in the final Olympic track and field tryouts Saturday and Sunday at the New Randall's island stadium.

So closely matched are the contestants and so packed with dynamite are the possibilities in at least six events, however, that few observers or coaches feel confident they can forecast the outcome.

This applies especially to the 400, 800 and 1500-meter runs, the 110-meter high hurdles, the running high jump, and the pole vault, in all of which world record smashers will swing into action against formidable rivals.

Otherwise pronounced favorites have developed in the qualifying competition.

About 300 athletes, picked on the basis of sectional tryouts or past performances, will compete for about 60 remaining places on the American track and field team.

Already ten Olympians have been named as a result of final tests in four events, the marathon, 10,000-meter run, 50,000 meter walk and deathly. There are 23 Olympic events, including the 400 and 1600 meter relays. Thus there will be competition in 17 individual events this coming week end.

Whether the U. S. A. sends a full team, including the maximum of three entries in each individual competition, depends on the gate receipts for the final tryouts.

The national A. A. U. championships completed Saturday at Princeton demonstrated that most of the Olympic favorites, along with a number of new-comers to stardom, are ripe for another record-smashing battle.

Such stalwarts as Jesse Owens of Ohio State, Don Lash of Indiana, Forrest (Spec) Towns of Georgia, Glenn (Slats) Hardin of Louisiana State, and Glenn Cunningham of Kansas came through with decisive title victories.

The latest pole vaulting sensation, 22-year old George Varoff of the Olympic club, San Francisco, hoisted himself over the bar at the new world record height of 14 feet, 6 1/2 inches to make Uncle Sam forget that the previous record-holder, Yale's Keith Brown, isn't available. Varoff beat two consistent 14-footers, Archie Meadows and Bill Sefton of Southern California.

These three coast stars must yet of Rice Institute and Bill Graber, Southern California veteran, who soared to record heights in 1932 and is making a fine comeback.

Scarcely less terrific in the prospect in the high jump, Five jumpers, led by Janky Cornelius Johnson, Los Angeles negro, cleared 6 feet, 7 inches in the national championships. Johnson and two other negroes, Mel Walker and Dave Albritton of Ohio State, cleared 6-8 and took shots at a world record.

Walter Marty, who holds the world mark of 6-9 1/4, and Ed Burke, Marquette negro, will be in the thick of the Olympic test, along with several others who have ranged between 6-6 and 6-9 in this specialty.

Brundage Appeals For More Support Games Candidates

New York, July 6 (AP)—A nationwide public appeal for funds to "send to Berlin the greatest Olympic team America ever assembled," was made today by Avery Brundage, president of the American Olympic committee.

With sailing date only nine days away, Brundage reported almost \$150,000 is needed to give the United States full representation in the Berlin games.

Jeremiah T. Mahoney, former president of the A. A. U., who led the fight against American participation in the games on the grounds of Nazi persecution, charged that the lack of funds was "evidence that Americans are boycotting the Olympics."

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Portland Takes Twin Bill with Seattle as Oaks Recapture Lead

Oakland roosted at the top of the standings again today by virtue of twin wins over Sacramento while the erstwhile pace-setting Seattle Indians were suffering a double setback from the Portland Beavers in Sunday coast league contests.

The week's outstanding baseball feat, however, was performed by Los Angeles, which broke into the 500 column by capturing seven out of eight games from San Diego. The Angels, playing 682 ball in the past three weeks, replaced the Padres in fifth place Saturday, and now are only 5 1/2 games out of first place.

The Seraphs, San Francisco Missions, Portland and Oakland won double-headers yesterday. Los Angeles trimmed San Diego, 3-1, 4-3; Portland shellacked the Indians, 6-1, 10-3; Oakland subdued the Solons, 4-3, 1-0, and the Missions triumphed over the San Francisco Seals, 8-5, 5-1.

In elevating the Acorns to first place, Jimmy Tobin and Jack Larocca won pitching duels with the best of the Solon pitching force. In the seven-inning nightcap Nathan Andrews limited the Oaks to two hits, but saw his efforts nullified when he fielded a bunt too slowly in the sixth and allowed Bernie Develivero, who had doubled, to reach third, from where he scored on an infield out.

Lou Koupal, Seattle ace, was hit hard by the Beavers while Ad Liska was pitching seven hit ball in the first game, while in the second homers by Herman Michael and Freddie Muller failed to offset a 15 hit barrage laid down by the Beavers against three Indian flingers. George Casier allowed the losers only three hits, and won his 16th game of the season.

CARDS CLIMB OVER CHICAGO TO 1ST PLACE

New York, July 6 (AP)—Every team in the National league first division swapped places yesterday. The St. Louis Cardinals traded places with the Chicago Cubs, climbing from second to first and the Pittsburgh Pirates took over third from Cincinnati's Reds who were reduced to fourth.

Coming from behind the Cards scored four runs in the ninth to send the Reds to defeat, 8 to 6, in the first game, but the nightcap was a walk-away, 17-7. The Cubs, meantime, took a 4 to 2 beating from the Pirates.

Brooklyn won its first game in six starts, 4 to 2, from the Giants. The Philadelphia Phillies increased their winning streak to five games with a 7 to 6 decision over the Boston Bees.

Jimmy DeShong turned his former New York Yankee mates back with eight hits as Washington batted out a 9 to 3 win which trimmed a full game from the Yanks' substantial American league lead.

Detroit's world champion Tigers won their 13th game out of 15 starts by overwhelming the St. Louis Browns 18 to 9.

The Boston Red Sox, virtually deadlocked with the Tigers, walloped the Philadelphia Athletics twice 15 to 9 and 8 to 2.

Cleveland and Chicago split a twin bill, the Indians taking the first 11 to 4, and the White Sox the nightcap 4 to 2.

SPINA AND BROWN SETTLE ARGUMENT

Portland, July 6 (AP)—An old argument in northwest fistic circles will take the shortest way to an answer tonight when Al Spina and Buzz Brown meet in a featherweight bout over the 10 round route.

Spina, flashy Portland boxer who has cut a spectacular path through the fistic ranks of the featherweights in recent months, defeating such topnotchers as Speedy Dado, Young Tommy, Frankie Castillo and Tuffy Pierpont, will go into the ring the underdog.

The boys who risk their money, on such things are betting 2 to 2 that Brown, Minneapolis product, comes out with the fame, although large amounts of Spina money made even money possible by ring time.

Brown was given the edge in early betting because of his experience, with Spina supporters counting on the young Italian's punch.

Each must scale 125 pounds or forfeit 25 per cent of the purse.

Kennewick, Wash., July 6 (AP)—Death rode a bronco with Francis Johnson, young Pendleton Indian, in the July Fourth rodeo here. He died in a hospital of injuries received when a buckaroo threw him. The bronco kicked him over the heart as he fell.

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DEAN OR DAVIS SCHEDULED FOR ALL STAR GAME

Boston, July 6 (AP)—The National league will concede about 22 points in battling to the American league sluggers when the pick of both circuits line up tomorrow for their annual all-star baseball game.

Manager Joe McCarthy has at his disposal an array of American league sluggers hitting the ball for about 334.

The question seems to be whether Charlie Grimm's senior circuit representatives, batting for 312, have the pitchers to subdue such clubbers as Lou Gehrig, young Joe DiMaggio and Bill Dickey of the Yankees, Jimmy Foss of the Red Sox, Earl Averill of the Indians, and Charley Gehringer of the Tigers.

The starting pitching berth for the National leaguers seems to rest between St. Louis' Dizzy Dean and Chicago's Curt Davis.

Manager McCarthy has two stellar southpaws available—Lefty Grove and Vernon Gomes—but whether he will open with one of them against the National leaguers many right-handed batters is uncertain.

The game will be played under world series rules at 12:30 p.m. E.S.T. at Boston National league park. The park seats 42,000.

Woodburn Juniors To Play Hillsboro

HUSKIES ROW HEADIEST RACE

Princeton, N. J., July 6 (AP)—There is so much optimism over Uncle Sam's chances in some branches of Olympic competition that it may be just as well to have at least one pessimist among America's representatives.

He is Al Ulbrickson silver-haired coach of the University of Washington crew which has the task of perpetuating the United States' supremacy started in 1920 by the Navy.

The Washington Huskies, winners of the intercollegiate championship at four miles at Poughkeepsie last month, ran off with the final Olympic tryouts on Lake Carnegie yesterday in one of the headiest performances of rowing ever seen on American waters.

Nothing is certain as far as the American Olympic rowing squad is concerned. Chairman Henry Penn Burke announced that only \$6000 of the necessary \$16,000 to finance a 32-man squad is in. It is up to Washington and the clubs which the other successful oarsmen represent to raise the deficit in the next ten days.
