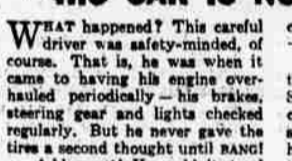
Mr. Thompson also made a list of needed additional tables and outdoor stoves and will seek to have these supplied.
