

SALEM REACHES FINALS IN SEMI-PRO TOURNAMENT

GASTINEAU FANS 16 AS SENATORS BEAT OAK GROVE

Portland, Ore., July 13 (AP)—The Salem Senators occupied a favorite position in the Oregon semi-pro baseball tournament today as a result of their decisive 10 to 0 victory over the previously undefeated Oak Grove nine last night.

Jerry Gastineau, Willamette university hurler on the mound for the Senators, yielded but 5 hits and whiffed 16 men. His teammates, Manning and Harriman, pounded out three hits in five times up and shoots blasted three safe ones in only four times at bat.

Hop Gold remained in the championship bracket by defeating Toledo 6 to 3 Saturday night.

Uncle Sam's Athletes Marshalling for Trip To Olympics, Germany

New York, July 13 (U.P.)—The United States marshalled its mighty track and field forces today for the Olympic aragoy to Berlin and the defense of the world's title this country has held since revival of the ancient athletic carnival at Athens in 1896.

The 56 members of the men's track and field team, selected in the final competition of the bitterest bling tryouts ever held, will sail Wednesday for Germany with the other Athletic teams—a total of 277 athletes—on the S. S. Manhattan. The Olympic games open August 1.

Breaking eight Olympic, two American and two world records, Uncle Sam's 1936 team is the most powerful array of athletic talent ever assembled by one nation.

It is so good four world's record holders—Blasin' Ben Eastman, 800 meters, Bill Bonthron, 1500 meters, Walter Marty, high jump, and George Varoff, pole vault—couldn't make it.

The stars of stars of America's greatest Olympic army is septiatinted Jesse Owens, Ohio State, who won the 100 meter in 10.4 seconds, broke the world's record for the 200 meters around one turn in 21 seconds, and eclipsed the Olympic broad jump mark with a leap of 25 feet, 10 1/2 inches.

Two other athletes made two places for themselves on the team—Don Lash of the University of Indiana in the 5,000 and 10,000 meters and Bobby Clark, Olympic club, San Francisco, in the decathlon and broad jump. Frank Wykoff, Glendale, Calif., sprinter, and Lee Bartlett, Detroit, javelin thrower, made the team for the third time.

MARION SQUAD WINS DISTRICT TITLE, 15 TO 2

Woodburn—Woodburn's Marion county Junior League baseball team annexed the district championship by a smashing 15-2 victory over the Hillsboro Juniors at Legion Park here Sunday afternoon.

Hillsboro opened with a run in the first inning but Lee, Woodburn's first batter in the locals' half of the first, drew a base on balls and scored on Meyers' single to tie the count. Not to be outdone, the Hillsboro lads came back with another score in the second frame and going into the third the Washington county team held a 2-1 lead. Farthing, Woodburn pitcher, held his opponents to five scattered hits, never allowing more than one an inning. His team mates fielded very loosely behind him, committing ten misplays. Farthing struck out four batters and walked only one. Jensen, on the mound for the visitors, was found for nine hits by Coach Pete DeGuire's hitters. Jensen walked nine and hit one by a pitched ball. Van Damlin, who took over the mound after two were out in the sixth, walked home and allowed four hits.

The district champs will meet the Astoria Juniors at Astoria at a date to be announced later for the right to participate in the state championship series to be held here August 1 and 2.

DODGERS CLIP CARDINAL LEAD TO HALF GAME

When it comes time to write the history of the 1936 big league campaign, the "breaks" of the week-end just past may tell the story of the up-to-now tight and dizzy National League race.

At any rate, if the gas house gang from St. Louis misses out of the pennant, it can easily point to the events of those two days as the root of all the evil that befell it.

When Dizzy Dean was knocked out by Burgess Whitehead's line drive in Saturday's game with the Giants, it took from the Cards the one man who has done more than any other to keep them up in the race. He will be out for at least a week.

Just as if things were not bad enough, the daffy and docile Dodgers picked this same week-end to get tough, and used the Cards to prove it. They belted out a doubleheader Sunday victory, 6-3 and 11-4, and just about knocked the Cards out of the league leadership.

With the fast climbing Chicago Cubs breaking even with the Giants, winning a doubleheader opener, 4-2, and then dropping the nightcap 8-6 on the strength of a seven run, second inning New York rally, the Dodgers' double trouncing of the Cards clipped the St. Louis lead to half a game.

The Phillies wrote another chapter in the sudden collapse of the Cincinnati Reds, Joe Bowman the opener of a twin bill, stretching the Reds losing streak to six straight. In the second game, the Reds outlasted the Phils for 11 innings and a 4-3 decision.
