

## POLK FARMERS ELIGIBLE FOR FEDERAL HELP

Dallas—Nearly a thousand Polk county farms are eligible under the 1936 agricultural conservation program. A total of 578 work sheets for the many farms are on file in the county agent's office. These farms include 78,533 cultivated acres of 60 per cent of the total of the county.

Farmers of Polk county have taken an active interest in the new program. The proportion of farmers that indicate they will cooperate in this program of soil building and conservation is higher than most all of the counties in the state.

The committee of local farmers has already worked several days in checking the work sheets and in various ways getting them ready for inspection by the state committee. Clerks in the county agent's office are attending to the multiplicity of paper work that goes with such a large program. In the next few weeks, perhaps late in August or early September, the job of determining which farms have complied in 1936 will be undertaken.

This fall thousands of acres of fruit and nut plantings will be seeded to cover crops for contemplated compliance with the 1937 program. Details of the 1937 program may vary from those under which farmers are cooperating this year.

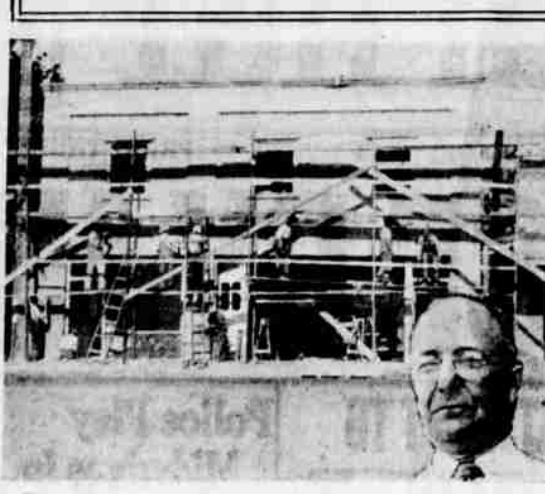
