

HOP FESTIVAL BACKERS SIGN RODEO PAPERS

Special features and attractions for the third annual Hop fiesta to be held in Independence the last week in August, reveals that the Adams rodeo will again take its place on the program. This was definitely decided by the committee at its meeting and a contract has been drawn with Ray Adams to put on the show. This will be staged each afternoon of the festival and Adams has assured the committee that he will have a brilliant array of riders, horses, cattle and other events that will add to the success of the affair.

The signing of the contract virtually completes the program for the fiesta. Coronation of the Hop queen will be held Thursday night, and Friday morning there will be a grand parade, a rodeo in the afternoon and a special program for the evening. Other events, entertainment will include donkey polo, carnival and dancing.

Saturday's program calls for a junior parade in the morning, rodeo in the afternoon and donkey polo and carnival attractions in the evening.

The hop bowl organization will begin to complete details of their program with other entertainment features, band concerts and other attractions provided by visiting delegations from other valley towns.

The people of this section are assured of a better program than in former years. The grounds are in excellent condition, having been improved somewhat over last year. Flood lights will be added and the seating capacity extended with more comfortable seats.

UNION SCHOOLS DEPEND MOSTLY UPON FINANCES

Seio—"A union high school is practicable only if the combined valuation of the districts forming the union is approximately a million dollars, and there are enough students to maintain a school of 80 to 100 enrollment, employing three or four teachers." J. M. Bennett, Linn county school superintendent, summarized at a meeting of representatives of interested districts in Seio high auditorium Friday evening.

Of the eight union high schools formed in Linn county, Bennett related, four have been successful, while the other four have disbanded because of too small an enrollment and proximity to larger schools.

Bennett further expressed the opinion that a union high school for Seio would be a satisfactory way of bringing the school up to standards required by the state board of education.

The present Seio building, housing both grades and high school, is under standard in several respects, chiefly electricity, dark floors and insufficient lighting in some classrooms. Library and laboratory facilities also are inadequate, it was pointed out.

Bennett named nine districts in the Seio area, who, if they joined with Seio to form a union high school, would possess a combined valuation large enough to make the movement successful. Added to Seio's district, No. 95, valuation of \$206,719, are the following proposed districts: District No. 10, River-view, \$99,000; No. 22, Billeu Den, \$174,400; No. 68, Munkers, \$121,472; No. 76, Oakview, \$65,836; No. 83, Shindler, \$98,880; No. 11, Cole, \$60,000; No. 12, Mt. Pleasant, \$71,000; No. 71, Sheiburn, \$109,863.

Districts outside of Seio are being taxed 4.4 mills by the non-high school board. Bennett pointed out that if these districts were to form a union district, taxes would be only 3.6, based on figures for the cost of running Seio high school during the last year. If a new building is constructed in the near future, Bennett added, taxes would be slightly higher.

A frame building costing approximately \$30,000 has been recommended as practicable for Seio. Of this amount, 45 percent (\$13,500) is available in a federal grant, while only the remaining 55 percent would be paid by the union district. Equipment at present owned by Seio district would probably be given to the union district.

The union district, Bennett emphasized, would not assume Seio's debt, but would start the movement free of debt and as a separate entity. Five directors form the basis of a union district, no two being elected from the same district. If there are more than five districts in the union, directors are chosen alternately.
