

AID TO BLIND IS OFFERED TO DALLAS GROUP

Dallas—The main item of business transacted at a regular meeting of the city council Monday night, presided over by Mayor L. E. Finney, was the first reading of a city ordinance designed to protect blind or partially blind pedestrians from accidents and injuries while on the public thoroughfares.

The ordinance is based on the same lines as that enacted by the city of Chicago under the guidance of the late Mayor Cermak. Section one authorizes the use of a white cane or stick by blind or partially blind persons. Section two makes it compulsory for any vehicle or pedestrian to stop and take precautions to avoid accident or injury to persons carrying a white cane and section three provides the penalty for non-compliance of the ordinance and sets a fine of not more than one dollar nor more than \$100.

The proposed ordinance is the follow-up to a letter sent the council by the Blind Relief Fund, Inc.

White canes are furnished free to any blind person who cares to communicate with the organization. Jack Allgood, chairman of the park committee, reported that the accommodations at the city park are being severely taxed due to the heavy demands being made upon them. Three new stoves are being constructed and Allgood also reported that the list of reservations for the month of August had already reached a high mark.

Rev. Burke resigned in order to take over the position of acting dean and business manager of the Northwest Christian college at Eugene where he has been teaching for the past six years. He has been pastor of the Dallas church for the past six years and three months, the longest term of office held by any minister who has ever been associated with the local church.
