MUSHROOMS ARE NEW ENTERPRISE INDEPENDENCE

Monmouth—A commercial enterprise, new to this part of the country, is being carried on as an experiment by Mr. and Mrs. Marion O'Brien and the latter's mother, Mrs. J. O. Andrus, at their home in East Main street.

The growing of mushrooms for the public market has been successfully undertaken in Tillamook, Sheridan and McMinnville, but this is the first time the venture has been tried in Monmouth.

Trays covering a dimension of 250 square feet have been prepared with fresh fertilizer, finely pulverized and placed in a dark room. The fungus growth, commercially prepared in brick size blocks and both light in color and weight, are pressed into the prepared trays. The mushrooms, started nine weeks ago, first began to appear about eight weeks later or four days since. They will continue to bear continuously for four or five months when once producing and are of three species, pink, brown and white.

Only the white have been planted at the Andrus home. They are contracted to Western Mushroom company in Portland.

BEACH JUBILEE AND PAGEANTRY CALL TO COAST

Manzanita—A six mile race between Wheeler and Manzanita to be one of the events staged next Saturday, in connection with the Tillamook Beaches Jubilee, to be held in this county on July 31, August 1 and 2, is attracting a large number of entries.

Cash and merchandise prizes will be presented to the first five runners to finish. The marathon course parallels the highway, which will afford motorists an opportunity of following the contestants during the entire race.

The marathon will follow the Sons of Neptune, aquatic show, on Nehalem bay, and will precede the treasure hunt to be held on Neah-Kah-Nie mountain, in which hundreds of cash and merchandise prizes will be hidden, and jubilee visitors given the opportunity to exercise the finders-keepers rule.

Other events on the jubilee program include a juvenile track meet, bicycle marathon, surf swimming race and life saving demonstration by the U. S. coast guard, to be held Friday at Netarts and Oceano; a fly casting tournament at Lake Lytle, a bathing beauty contest, comic track meet, horseshoe pitching tournament, dances and carnival at Rockaway on Sunday.

Tillamook will be the scene of the "March of Progress" pageant, the major attraction of the jubilee. This big out-of-doors production, with a cast of 300 people, portrays, in a series of episodes, the outstanding events in the history of Tillamook county, from the coming of the first white man to the anticipated completion of the Willson river highway in 1937. Two performances of the pageant will be given, one on Saturday evening, and the other on Sunday afternoon. It will be staged at the county fair grounds.

HUBBARD WELCOMES CREAMERY PROPOSAL

Hubbard—Garfield Voget, mayor of Hubbard, has long been recognized by the community as one of its foremost and keen sighted business men. This has again been made evident by the recent decision of the Hubbard Creamery company which he heads to build storage lockers for community use at the creamery plant.

According to plans meat, berries, corn and other vegetables and fruit can be stored for a nominal charge. The building will be large enough to cover 300 lockers of standard size. Equipment will include a cooling room where meat may be cooled before shipment to other places or before placing in the lockers. Scales to take care of produce will also be placed. Mayor Voget hopes to have the plant ready for community use by the first of September.

FLAX FESTIVAL DATE UNCERTAIN BUT PLANS MADE

Mt. Angel—The flax festival was the main topic discussed at the regular meeting of the Mt. Angel Business Men's club which was held in the Mt. Angel hotel Monday noon.

SCIO LOWEST SCHOOL COST

Albany—Linn county high school students cost taxpayers of 11 school districts \$134,289.91 for the year 1935-36, it was announced by County School Superintendent J. M. Bennett, who has finished his compilation of figures.

A total of 1,778 students were enrolled in high schools throughout the county, costing an average of \$96.78 per pupil for the year. Albany, with an enrollment of 624, was below the general average, the per pupil cost totaling \$87.18.

Scio with 109 pupils had the lowest per student rate in the county, a \$61.80 maintenance cost for each student's education for the year. Tangent with 23 students had the high, \$135.55 per pupil.

Albany led in total cost, \$48,066.60, Lebanon had 376 pupils and a total expense of \$28,363.15. With the exception of Sweet Home all other schools were below the \$10,000 mark.

BATTLE WITH BULL IS FOUND SERIOUS
