

REALTORS LOOK TOWARD INFLUX OF POPULATION

Albany—Realtors of the Willamette valley took the initial steps in preparation for an estimated population influx of 100,000 as they met Tuesday night at the Albany hotel.

Optimism was the key-note of the meet at which the prediction was made that a tremendous migration into Oregon would be made within the next two years. Forerunners of that migration flowing in from the drought-stricken mid-west are already here, it was stated by the realtors.

A serious housing shortage is faced in Eugene and Portland, realtors from those cities declared, and during the past six weeks the shortage has become serious. Demands for houses far exceed the present supply, and are even greater than building orders.

It was stated by members of the organization that farm sales have undergone a tremendous increase. Hugh H. Earle, Salem, Oregon real estate commissioner, urged immediate preparation advocating a home building program to care for the settlers.

William L. Graham, Salem, deputy real estate commissioner, stated that emigrants from the parched mid-west have lauded Oregon highly. Daily the inflow goes on, and the increase is expected to begin in earnest during the fall. "It is necessary to find places for these people," he said.

It was moved to call a meeting of the state association of realtors, which has been inactive for two years.

Thirty-five realtors were present from every point in the valley.
