RECEPTION GIVEN PENSION DELEGATES

Monmouth—A large interested group of townspeople and friends of the movement participated Tuesday night in the reception accorded R. M. Miller, local delegate to the national Townsend convention in Cleveland, in the auditorium of the Christian church.

Mr. Miller's version of the convention was followed by an address by John Wier, national representative of the Townsend movement, on a speaking tour of the states west of the Mississippi river. In his somewhat lengthy talk Mr. Wier said: "If Jim Farley can bring the postal department out of arrears by a transaction tax on money orders and stamps, there is no doubt in my mind that a two per cent transaction tax on commodities will be sufficient to pay the revolving pension plan of \$200 per month to every person 60 years of age or over, but in ten years it will have paid the national debt."

TRAGEDY FILLS LIFE OF NURSE

Mill City—Several tragic incidents happened in connection with the recent fatal automobile accident near Niagara, as told by Mrs. Margaret Hulverson of Portland to Albert Millsap, whose property was the scene of the tragedy.

Sam Chamblin, 68-year-old veteran of two wars, who was killed in the accident while on his way to the Hot Springs for a two-day holiday from the Portland Veterans' hospital, was a sort of foster father to Mrs. Hulverson, while Hubert C. Turenne, driver of the automobile, is her adopted brother. Turenne was taken to Portland in a critical condition. Mrs. Hulverson rushed to the scene of the accident from Breitenbush Mineral Springs where she has been employed as a nurse at the bath house, her assistant, Mrs. Hubert Turenne, accompanying her.

The day following the accident, Mrs. Hulverson told the Millsaps of having gone to the home of a veteran pal of Chamblin to ask his assistance in making arrangements for a military funeral for his friend. Upon arrival at the place, she was shocked to see his burned body being carried out of his still smoldering home.

It also happens that Mrs. Hulverson's 23-year-old son was shot and killed last New Year's. "Being a nurse may explain how she has found the strength to stand up under the strain of so many terrible shocks."
