

VALLEY LURING FARMERS TIRED OF POOR CROPS

Corvallis—That people are coming into the Willamette valley and into Benton county from South Dakota and Nebraska and other mid-western states is evidenced by the fact that during the last two weeks more than 15 families from these states have applied at the local re-employment office for work. Probably more than 75 persons have been registered from these states during the last two months.

Those who have been placed on Benton county farm jobs have proved exceptional workers, knowing how to work and produce. Most of these men and women, if given a fair opportunity, will make good in Oregon. It is the belief of federal job officials.

In most cases, complete failures over a period of years have placed these newcomers in a critical condition financially. If they had remained in their own states, they would have been compelled to care for them from relief funds. This relief would have continued probably over a period of years, believe local officials.

In commenting upon this feature recently, Calvin Ingle, who has interviewed most of these people through his reemployment office, said, "While I am well aware of the barriers placed upon transient persons, I am of the opinion that if this relief could be transferred to these people and if they were allowed to use it in this valley, many of them could be placed on small acreages, and with a cow, a few chickens and their natural thrift, they would become self-supporting citizens. Should this not be done, I can see a real problem in local relief work for the coming winter."

JUBILEE CALLS LARGE CROWDS TO COAST TOWN

Tillamook—A crowd of several thousand people attended the opening of festivities of the Tillamook Beaches Jubilee, the big three-day celebration, which is being staged here and at surrounding beach communities, this week-end.

Netarts and Oceanside were the scenes of the first day's events, which included the coronation ceremonies for Queen Dorothy Dolan.

Governor Martin crowned the ruler of the Jubilee, the members of whose court included Crown Princess Emogene Barber, Princesses Lillian Parker, Jean Aren, Dorothy Olson and Hazel Murdoch, who has been designated as the Portland crown princess.

An elaborate program of entertainment was presented in connection with the coronation. Dignitaries present, including Governor Martin, were introduced by Judge H. H. Rosenberg of Tillamook. William S. Saunders, general chairman of the Jubilee, welcomed the visitors and introduced members of his committee, including Matt Terry, Netarts chairman, who in turn presented the committee members.

The Tillamook high school band, under direction of J. Harold Newman, played several numbers. Mrs. Henry Hessel sang "The Star Spangled Banner," the "Gulls of 1890," a group of talented artists, entertained with several numbers, Barbara Magnuson and Carol Cain danced, and the Hilly Billy band, a group of eccentric musicians, presented a novel act. Rev. W. W. Youngson delivered the invocation. Sam Slocum, Jubilee director, acted as master of ceremonies.

A junior track meet, bicycle races and a marathon walk from Netarts to Oceanside, followed the coronation. The U. S. coast guard gave a life saving demonstration on the beach at Oceanside, and members of the crew supervised the surf-swimming race, which concluded the afternoon's program. The queen's ball was held at the Rockaway dance hall in the evening.

Saturday's events will take place at the north Tillamook beaches, and will include a water sports show, featuring the Sons of Neptune, at Wheeler, a marathon, running race between Wheeler and Manzanita, and a treasure hunt at Neah-Kah-Nie.

Rockaway and Lake Lytle will entertain Jubilee visitors Sunday with a fly-casting and horse show, pitching tournament, a bathing beauty contest, comic track meet, carnival and dance.
