Detectives Eichenberger and Horack, who conducted an investigation after the woman's body, a wire tight around the neck, was found in a park here, said they believed lack of money caused her to take her own life. Two men questioned concerning the case were released.

YOUTH ADMITS HE WROTE NOTE

North Platte, Neb., Aug. 1 (AP)—Sterling W. Powell, 16-year-old farm boy charged with attempting to extort \$25,000 from the father of Shirley Temple, child actress, today pleaded guilty and waived preliminary hearing when he was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner A. P. Strelitz here.

Strelitz set bond for the youth at \$1,000 and bound him over to the federal district court for trial at the next term here, which starts June 8, 1937. Friends of the boy arranged the bond and he was released.

The accurate tracing of a sheet of stationery landed Powell in jail. Federal Agents late yesterday arrested the youth at his farm home at Grant, Neb. Sheriff H. Bechtel said Powell told him he conceived the fantastic scheme after seeing a movie based on a kidnapping theme, but "never meant to go through with it."

Bechtel reported the prisoner readily admitted he had sent a letter to George F. Temple, father of the little actress, setting forth in part:

"Unless \$25,000 is dropped from an airplane near Grant, Neb., on May 15, the life of Shirley Temple will be endangered."

The missive was mailed May 9 but it was not opened until May 18—three days after the specified deadline—in the fan mail department of the Twentieth Century-Fox studios in Hollywood.

At Washington, J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the justice department's bureau of investigation, related how the square of paper was subjected to scientific tests and traced through the manufacturer to stores at Grant and Madrid, Neb. Further undisclosed deductions led to the seizure of Powell.

Copyright, 1935, by United Press. Headquarters of Col. Villalba's loyalist column, Barbaastro, North-east Spain, Aug. 1 (AP)—Loyalists occupied the town of Sietamo today after a furious two-hour battle in which 10 government airplanes bombed and destroyed most of the village.

Victory enabled Col. Villalba's troops to concentrate upon the city of Huesca, on which 5,000 loyalist militiamen are now advancing for the purpose of cutting communications between strong rebel forces in Zaragoza and Huesca provinces.

Modernly armed, well equipped rebel troops, numbering about 700, put up a stubborn fight for Sietamo but finally fled in disorder in improvised armored cars.

Loyalist reinforcements were rushed up from the rear to support the advance of 5,000 militiamen on Huesca. A battle for possession of that key city appeared imminent.

Intense military preparation around Barbaastro presaged a mass offensive against the rebel forces.

Paris, Aug. 1 (AP)—France's socialists, determined to pursue a middle-of-the-road policy in respect to Spain's civil war, today announced French volunteers may fight across the border but must not carry arms on French soil.

Disturbed by the possibility of international repercussions from the flight of Italian airplanes to Spanish Morocco, the French cabinet held a prolonged discussion on the question of French nationals fighting in Spain.

Fresh indications were at hand that Blum's government was gravely concerned over the airplane incident. Members of the cabinet hinted that Paris was conferring with Rome and perhaps Madrid and other capitals on the question.

Beckham has the support of Gov. A. B. Chandler.

Levy, an incorrigible, was shackled with an "Oregon boot," heavy leg iron, to keep him from escaping. When the boot was cut off with an acetylene torch, Levy said his leg was painfully burned.

SCRIBE IN DAZE WHEN HE TRIES TO WRITE RIOT

Things happened so fast within Oregon's penitentiary walls yesterday when 700 howling and frenzied convicts hurled defiance at prison guards and Warden James Lewis that I am still dazed at what I saw.

I stood in the yard near the commissary and watched hundreds of prisoners, under orders from a youth waving a megaphone, carry food and tobacco to the far end of the grounds. They milled around the yard, the chapel or reception room, in and out of the cell blocks, ignoring unarmed guards who helplessly watched the proceedings.

Many of them yelling for the sheer enjoyment of making a noise and others shouting profane epithets at officials and guards, the convicts took complete possession of the institution up to the turnkey's post. And they were a grim, hot and threatening looking gang.

The youth with the megaphone then ordered all the men to the island (recreational ground) where the tenorless indicated other things were being planned. Suddenly it happened.

There was a yell. "Come on guys—let's make a run for it!"

The prison guards on the walls, however, were ready. Several score men dashed toward tower No. 6 and as they crossed the "dead-line" there was a shot and I saw a man in the center of the group fall and roll over, screaming.

I didn't wait any longer. I dashed back into the chapel and heard two more shots, coming from another direction and two more convicts fell. Throwing I saw men run in every direction seeking what cover they could. The shouts of the leaders were drowned out.

There was a momentary lull and the dash for freedom checked. Some of the convicts picked up the wounded and started for the hospital which entrance was through the chapel.

Then it broke out again and an angry mob started for the chapel. The guards sprung into action and threatened more firing if any but those carrying the wounded entered. They stopped long enough for the doors to be closed behind the injured.

There were more murmurings and I saw the reason. On the walls stood 300 armed state policemen. They said nothing but in their hands they carried tear gas guns—and the convicts knew it—they knew too what the police intended to do.

The shouting quieted down and uneasy men milled about the island. Unarmed guards were skirting the mob talking quietly to the men. Attempts of the leaders to renew their efforts met with little response. The men appeared beaten.

The usual signal for the lineup to parade to the prison was given. The prisoners forgot their threats to stay out all night.

Sullenly, but without resistance, the convicts fell into line and with folded arms, loaded with groceries and tobacco, with various weapons in their pockets, marched into the cell blocks.

With a start I noticed the yard was empty, calm appearing as on many other occasions I had seen it. It seemed haunting that where a moment ago 700 yelling men, many of them had been killed, that quiet now prevailed and only the grim walls of the prison showed.

It seemed like a bad dream.

present release laws to give the prisoners some incentive for good behavior and reform.

For 13 years the penitentiary, along with most other states and the federal government, granted good behavior allowances until the attorney-general ruled that a parole by the governor was necessary for release of prisoners, and that such release was a matter of "grace, not of right."

The decision, coming just before the scheduled release of Earl H. Fehl, former Jackson county judge, has withstood two court tests and another suit and an appeal to the supreme court are still pending.
