

JOB ARE FILLED BY LINN OFFICE; BUDGET SLICED

Albany—Disclosure was made today from the office of the re-employment agent that jobs were given, mostly within Linn county, to 441 persons by the federal re-employment office here during July. Approximately 300 of the 441 given work were placed in agricultural work, the remaining were varied. Although some were relief clients, none of the positions was relief job. Ralph Coleman, re-employment agent said, July total was slightly below that of June.

ORDER IN EFFECT
Albany—Four hundred dollars has been allocated from Linn county's relief budget following an order from Elmer R. Goudy, state administrator, due to the rise in seasonal employment, it was made known today at local headquarters. A more strict program and supervision of finances is necessary, according to Olive Gearhart, relief worker, but the reduction will not stop local work at the present. It is possible that a few hospitalization cases may be delayed due to this recent order, which goes into effect this week.

NEW WELL DRILLING EQUIPMENT BOUGHT

Swegle—R. A. West and sons recently purchased from the Star Drilling Machine company of Portland an all steel Speed Star well drilling machine which is manufactured in Akron, Ohio. Among other numerous improvements over the older type machine are the wire cable which replaces the rope and the spring shock absorbers which insure the proper hit when drilling. It handles a 1000 pound drill to a depth of 800 feet, however, there is no limit to the depth it can drill and it is capable of drilling for 12 inch casing. The machine is mounted on a 2 1/2 ton truck.

West and sons are now drilling and 8 inch well for Charles Vick on the property just north of Garden Road about one-half mile from the city limits. This well will furnish at least a dozen homes with water.

CORVALLIS BUS RULING IS MADE

Corvallis—City busses will stop only at street corners from now on it was ordered by the city council after considerable discussion had taken place as to the matter of allowing the busses to stop midway between intersections as has been the practice for some time.

During the discussion it was also brought out that the city busses are not required to stop at railroad crossings inside the city limits. This rule was made by City Attorney Jay Lewis in response to questions from members of the council.

The police department was directed to intensify its efforts to have tall grass on vacant lots throughout the city cut down.

A petition was sent before the council asking the city to pass an ordinance giving blind persons carrying white canes the right of way at all street crossings. The petition was brought by the Oregon Blind Relief committee and is part of a nation-wide campaign along this line to get all cities to pass a uniform regulation. The committee will furnish white canes to all blind persons who desire them. This matter was turned over to the ordinance committee for consideration.

COUNCIL TELLS STAYTON FOLKS TO SHELL OUT

Stayton—Stayton residents, delinquent for the past several years in the payment of street assessments, are to be the defendants in actions to be instituted by the common council for the collection of the payments.

This was the decision at the monthly meeting of the aldermen, conducted for the first time in the new city hall, here Monday night. City Attorney George R. Duncan was instructed by the council to prepare a list of delinquent property owners so that definite action might be mapped out for the collection of the assessments.

"The city has been lenient with the property owners here because of the adverse conditions," Mayor Smith said, "but times are better now and there is no reason why these delinquent payments should not be met."

"We are willing to cooperate with the property owner to the fullest extent but some effort must be made immediately to satisfy the past assessments or action will be taken at once."

The council was notified the city of Salem had approved the terms demanded by Stayton for the right to an easement through the streets of the town for the laying of the water pipe from Stayton Island. According to the contract offered, Salem is to pay the town of Stayton \$200 and leave the streets in good condition after the work has been completed. Salem engineers agreed not to block any private alley or driveway without the sanction of the property owner.

According to the agreement the pipe will be laid at a depth of 18 inches from the surface and will undercross all local water and irrigation pipes.

This requisition was demanded because of the possibility of the construction of a sewage system in Stayton. The project has been discussed informally several times by the council but no action has been taken because of the limited city funds available at this time.

A committee to serve with the council as the budget committee for the estimation of expenditures and the tax levy for next year was appointed Monday night. The committee includes Grant Murphy, George H. Bell, C. A. Beauchamp and Jacob Spaniol. The budget committee will meet at the next regular session of the council in September.

SCIO CZECH FARMER VISITING OLD HOME
Scio—Frank Bartu, Sr., 71-year-old Czech farmer, left Scio Tuesday by bus for New York City. He will sail August 12 on the "Queen Mary" for an extended visit with his aged mother and his sister in Checkoslovakia.

Mr. Bartu was born in Moravia, now part of Czechoslovakia, and came to the United States when he was 18 years of age. He has spent most of the time since on a farm in the Larwood district nine miles east of Scio. Mr. Bartu made a brief trip to his native country in 1914, but was compelled to return hurriedly to his adopted land because of war conditions.

Mr. and Mrs. Bartu recently celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. Both are naturalized United States citizens.
