

FLAX FESTIVAL IS SET FOR EARLY IN SEPTEMBER

MT. ANGEL WILL CELEBRATE WITH THREE BIG DAYS

MT. ANGEL—Since the dates September 3 to 5 have been set for the three-day flax festival which will be held in connection with the dedication of the local flax plant, the approving of the tentative plans for the affair will be the main business of the Business Men's club when they meet Monday noon.

Thursday evening August 20, there will be a queen candidates' ball at St. Mary's auditorium at which all the candidates for the queenship will receive special recognition.

The actual festivities will begin Thursday evening, September 3, at 8:30 p. m. with a softball game between the Mt. Angel All-Stars and the team winning the state tournament. Following the softball game will be the coronation dance at the new flax plant just north of Mt. Angel, when the queen and her court will be crowned with appropriate ceremonies.

The next event will be a donkey baseball game at 8:00 o'clock on Friday evening at 8 o'clock. This will be followed by a dance either at the flax plant or at the auditorium.

Saturday, September 5, is to be the gala day of the entire dedication ceremonies. Beginning with a parade at 10 a. m. in which Canby, Molalla, Oregon City, Silverton, Monitor, Salem and Eugene have promised to take part. The communities of Eugene and Canby are particularly interested since they consider this festival a dedication of the plants at their towns at the same time. The parade will pass in review before Governor Charles H. Martin, Senator Charles L. McNary, W. P. Administrator E. J. Griffith and other dignitaries and state and federal officials. Addresses will be delivered at the close of the parade by each of these gentlemen, after which there will be time out for lunch. Immediately after lunch there will be a baseball game at Ebner field, presumably between the Silverton team and either the Salem Senators or the Woodburn Townies, followed by a program of sports at the park consisting of a tug-of-war, baseball throwing contest, foot races, egg races and other features. About 7:30 or 8 p. m. it is planned to have an uptown concert by the band and the men's chorus which will close with a wrestling match at Ebner park followed by a dance at the flax plant. So far the plans are tentative and will have to be okayed by the business men.

LODGE STAGE DAY OF MOVES

Monmouth—The fraternity equipment of the various orders which have held forth in the Odd Fellows hall for a number of years has now been moved to quarters on the upper floor of the Monmouth Improvement company in the postoffice block.

The Odd Fellows building, a community effort, was erected about 15 years ago by some 40 stockholders, all Odd Fellows or Rebekahs, who contributed from \$50 to \$300 each. The original cost, including land, was in the neighborhood of \$25,000. For a time the building was a good investment and progress was made in paying off obligations. During the depression the building was lost for a mortgage of less than half of the original cost.

Everything movable in the hall, including cupboards, chairs, wall seats, range, stove and canopies have been taken to the new quarters and stored until reconstruction work on the upper floor, largely to be done by the Odd Fellows themselves during the coming fall. The Odd Fellows own stock in this building, having held it since their previous occupancy, prior to the erection of the large brick building on Main and Knox streets.
