

QUEEN CONTEST IS WARMING UP FOR HOP FIESTA

MANY PICKERS IN POLK YARDS TO MAKE CROWD

Independence—Plans for the third annual Hop Fiesta, to be held here August 27 to 30, inclusive, are rapidly being completed. A much more elaborate program of entertainment than has ever been attempted is being arranged for this year's celebration by the large committee in charge of the staging of the festival.

A queen contest is now being conducted to select a queen, crown princess, and four princesses to rule over the fiesta. The winner will receive an expense-free trip to Alaska. Young women already entered in the contest are: Betty Wattenburg, Alice Bocella, Lorena Burchfield, Georgia Housley, Zelma Thompson, Marie Case, Imogene Tidd of Independence; Opal Burch of Salem; Margie Inman of Silverton; and Verma Christensen of Monmouth. Several other candidates will be announced this week. The contest will close August 26th.

The opening event of the fiesta will be the coronation ceremonies for the queen, which will take place at the hop bowl—the large municipal stadium, located in the heart of the Independence business district, at 8 o'clock August 27. Governor Charles H. Martin will crown the fiesta ruler.

Other attractions of the four-day festival will include a rodeo to be presented under the direction of Ray Adams, well known horseman and rider, who will use over a hundred head of stock, including horses, steers, bulls and calves in the various events of the show during which many cash and merchandise prizes will be presented to winners of the calf riding, bucking horse, wild cow milking, calf and steer roping and bulldogging contests; a Cinderella pageant, a gorgeous fairy-story spectacle employing a large cast of youngsters, a carnival, a monster street parade, donkey polo games, and dances.

An unusually large number of hop pickers are expected to be here for the fiesta this year, due to the fact that the local hop crop is exceptionally good, and that there is a poor yield in many other hop growing sections.

BILL PAYMENTS WATER MATTERS OCCUPY COUNCIL

Scio—Payment of bills and consideration of street and water matters occupied the time at the monthly meeting of the Scio city council Thursday evening.

Bills allowed were as follows: \$100.85 to the Mountain States Power company for power and lights; \$7.73 to J. P. Ouper, commission for collecting city water rents; \$8.20 to J. P. Ouper for labor; \$5 recorder's salary to O. B. Cyrus; \$5 marshal's salary to Fred Daley; \$2.50 to Scio garage for labor on city pump; \$7 to A. L. Plummer for labor and equipment; \$1.25 to Kende Service station for clamp for city water pipe; \$7.14 to Consolidated Supply company, Portland, for water mains equipment; \$94.80 to Crane company, Portland, for pipe and valve; bills of \$1.84 to R. M. Cain for electrical equipment, and \$300 to Linn county for hauling gravel were laid on the table for investigation.

The council voted to pay the county for hauling gravel, and oiling and graveling the streets at the rate of \$1500 per mile when the work is completed. A distance of approximately one-half mile of streets in north Scio has been surfaced.

An ordinance prohibiting damaging of oiled streets in the city limits by tractors or other heavy vehicles was read and approved by the council. Penalty imposed a fine of \$3 to \$50, or imprisonment in the city jail for 2 to 25 days, or both.

COUNCIL TAKES ZONING ACTION FOR MONMOUTH

Monmouth—In line with a movement for safer construction now being pushed by various municipal organizations in the country, the council at its session this week passed the zone building restriction ordinance designed for fire protection. It establishes a fire zone which covers Main street from Broad to Monmouth avenue, and Knox and Warren streets and Monmouth avenue to south city limits.

Wood construction for new buildings is forbidden within 25 feet of the property line, except for garages and certain types of storage in which building requirements are strictly limited. The ordinance provides for permits and inspections for the removal of unsafe buildings for restrictions in making alterations and additions. It governs the thickness of walls; forbids eaves on business structures, bans shingle roofs, states quality of materials, isolation of wood beams used in construction. It regulates exits, skylights and heating arrangements of various kinds and prescribes penalties for violation. No alterations, repairs or building can be done in the restricted district without a definite permit from the city to cover the proposed work. It regulates chimneys, smoke pipes, warm air conductors and registers, stoves and ranges. It limits the height of certain types of buildings and provides for the proper construction of fire stops and electrical installation.

Violations are punishable by fines of not less than ten dollars nor more than \$100, or by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by both fine and imprisonment. Each day violation is continued counts as a separate offense.

By providing and installing his own connecting pipe, Neal Edwards was granted the right of attaching to the city water main to provide water for use on his farm a short distance from the east boundary line of Monmouth.

The West Coast Construction company was granted an extension of twenty days to finish the water pipe work in the city due to the fact that 2237 additional feet of four and ten-inch pipe had been needed to be laid, and the engineers' requirement of 30 days' exposure to sight for pipe to ascertain if natural swellings of the pipe would stop small leaks.

FOREST FIRE DAMAGE CHARGED IN ACTION

Aurora—Suit for \$6364 damages was filed Tuesday by Elma Brewster against the Molalla Lumber company and C. W. Pilleri as the result of the forest fire in the Redland-Viola section last fall.

It is charged that H. H. Fischer, agent for the lumber company, holder of large timber tracts in the eastern part of the county, started a fire on 140 acres of slashings without obtaining a permit from the state fire warden, had not employed enough men to control the fire and had allowed it to burn into logged-off land where Pilleri had been operating, the blaze jumping to timber owned by the defendant.

It is claimed that the fire damaged the plaintiff's property to the extent of \$13,182, with double that amount being sought as punitive damages. It is claimed that the fire burned trees that would have made 2500 cords of wood, 100,000 feet of cedar, 1000 feet of fence and 25 cords of cut wood.

CORVALLIS HAS IDEAL WEATHER

Corvallis—The official weather report for this locality agrees with general observation that the climate in Corvallis during the month of July was as near ideal summer weather as could be desired. The weather report just made by W. L. Powers, head of the soils department, shows that the high temperature for the month was 91 degrees, with the average or mean maximum of 82.2, while the coolest temperature for the month was 51 degrees, although the temperature was in the fifties every night.

The mean minimum was 54.5 degrees. The mean or average temperature for the month was 68.3 degrees or 3.4 degrees under the normal of 71.7. The month opened cold and moist with slight precipitation on the third, eighth, tenth and eleventh, making a total rainfall of .32 of an inch as compared with the 44-year normal of .30.

MORE MEN ASSIGNED HIGHWAY PROJECT

Aurora—According to L. C. Stoll, manager of the Clackamas county employment office, fifteen more Clackamas county men were assigned this week to the Fisher brothers highway job on the Wapinitia project. This job will last for the next six weeks and the men will receive 75 and 50 cents an hour. Of the men assigned eleven were truck drivers, three were laborers and one was a fire spotter. Stoll also sent out additional men to another highway job being built by Babler brothers at Burns. This is a three months job. The local office also sent five more Clackamas county men to the Grand Coulee project, making a total of 35 sent within a week.
