

WALKER LOSES HOP BUILDINGS THROUGH FIRE

Independence—The first fire of the season to affect the hop growers in this community occurred on Friday when the hop houses on the old Young place north of town, now belonging to Dean Walker, burned to the ground. There were two houses in the group that had just been made ready for the year's harvest which was to begin August 20.

The origin of the fire is unknown and the alarm was given by a workman who was several hundred yards distant when he saw flames coming from the roof of the buildings.

Mr. Gwinn, manager for Walker, was at home at the time and got in touch with Independence and Monmouth fire departments by telephone and after continued effort saved several hundred cords of wood in the adjacent lot, and prevented further destruction by keeping down grass fires. The buildings were completely destroyed, together with all baskets and equipment. It will not be possible to rebuild the structures in time for the harvest and other drying facilities are being arranged by the owner. There are about 85 acres in hops. The greater part of these are early clusters and will be ready to harvest by August 30. It is considered a great loss at this particular time.

Tanks of water were supplied from wells to the fire apparatus which kept down grass fires and saved considerable wood.

Several years ago, it was recalled, buildings burned on that same location during the drying season, and were rebuilt by E. P. Young. The later structures had been equipped with the fan system for drying. It will necessitate hauling the green hops about two miles to a dryer.

JOINT REPORT FINISHED FOR SCHOOL UNITS

Aurora—According to announcement by County School Superintendent Katherine McRae, the consolidated annual report of all school districts of Clackamas county has been completed and delivered to the state department of education.

This is a consolidation of clerk's census reports, clerk's annual reports, teachers' annual reports, together with other statistics of the 116 elementary districts and eight high school districts of the county, the work requiring a large part of two months. The report shows there has been an increase in capital outlay for new sites, new buildings, furniture and equipment and a corresponding increase in the valuation of school property.

Many of these fine schools, among the best in the state, are now completed and ready for occupancy this coming school year and others will be completed early in the fall.

The new high schools are at Oregon City, Sandy and Batacoda with one new junior high at Milwaukie. The larger elementary schools are the Oregon City Barclay, Concord, Lake Grove, Molalla and Willamette. Eleven of these schools have been PWA and WPA, the others being built by straight contract.

OVER-SUPPLY OF HANDS LISTED

Aurora—The Oregon City re-employment office has an over-supply of capable farm hands listed now for year-around farm work as well as seasonal farm hands for haying, etc. L. C. Stoll, manager, announced Wednesday. Due to the fact that these men, married and single, have had long experience in farm work the employment office is only accepting farm jobs which pay \$20 or more a month, including board. Any farmer requiring help is asked to get in touch with the employment office at 8th and Railroad avenue.

However, there is a shortage of hop pickers and Stoll has requests for over 200 of these workers. Anyone wishing to pick hops is urged to register at once.

PETITION FILED ON DRAINAGE PROJECT

Aurora—A petition asking the formation of a South Willamette drainage district was filed with the Clackamas county court Thursday by property owners of that section and September 15 has been set for the date of hearings. The proposed district would drain about 600 acres of fine beaver dam land along the Willamette and if the project goes through much of this can be given over to onion growing. It is now being farmed under much difficulty because of the swampy conditions caused by low-lying and level ground.

All of the property owners affected by the proposed drainage district signed the petition and expressed a willingness to pay any taxes levied for the proposed work.

CREOSOTE FLAVOR AGAIN IN WATER

Monmouth—Monmouth folk are again experiencing the taste of creosote in the city water drawn from the mains. In some parts of the city the unpleasant flavor is especially strong, although it is now some time since the last of the new wood pipes which, painted with the oil as a preservative measure, impart the creosote tang, were laid and a copious use of the water for gardens and lawns had eliminated the unsavory flavor.

Fred Lofting, water superintendent, explains the fresh creosote taste comes from opening shut-off valves. He says the creosote oil has gathered around the valve and when the valve is opened a fresh dose is sent into the mains. A very little of this oil will give flavor to a lot of water.

DWORSCHAK FARM LOSES LARGE BARN

VALLEY PLAN REPORTED ON BY HAL RANDS

Aurora—A joint meeting of the Clackamas county planning board and the Willamette valley projects committee was held at the chamber of commerce Friday night, over 100 persons attending.

Hal Rands, senior engineer in charge of making an irrigation survey of the Willamette valley, gave a report of the United States engineers in this work, predicting a program costing \$40,000,000, taking 15 years to complete and including seven dams on the upper reaches of the Willamette river. He said that the survey of the proposed Canby irrigation district affecting about 6000 acres will be complete and will furnish property owners with definite data needed for establishing a district and he predicted that water could be put on that area next year if the district is formed and the funds made available.

He said that the Molalla flood control project is not so feasible as the Peikley dam site, the best available on the river, does not furnish a large enough storage basin to have any material effect in controlling floods and that irrigation from such a dam makes the cost per acre too high.

PLAN PAGEANT FOR FESTIVAL

Independence—The Cinderella pageant, to be staged in connection with the annual Hop Fiesta, to be held here August 27 to 30 inclusive, will employ a cast of over 100 children, and a chorus of 75 voices. It will be one of the most elaborate productions of its kind ever presented in the Willamette valley.

Special scenic sets for the pageant are now being constructed at the Hop Bowl, the Independence Municipal stadium, where the fairy play is to be held.

George Natanson, well-known producer of musical reviews, and Daisy Gibson, chorus director, are now in Independence, and will start rehearsals next Monday. Children from Dallas, Monmouth, Salem and Independence will be included in the cast.

Other events in the program of the fiesta include a rodeo, grand floral parade, donkey-polo games, a midnight variety show, carnivals, dances and a junior Hop Festival.

IMPROVEMENT AT HELMICK PLANNED

Corvallis—A request for the Corvallis chamber of commerce to back the Monmouth chamber in getting improvements made on Helmick park on the Luckiamute river between the two cities will be considered at the next meeting of the board here.

The Corvallis group has been informed that the park commission has been very interested in the proposition but does not want to go ahead until more land can be obtained to be added to the tract, and it reported that the owners of the adjoining land refuse to sell.

The two groups are to be asked to exert pressure in an attempt to get more land, and subsequently to present a plan to the state park commission to get the improvements under way.

BONNEY REUNION HEARS STORY OF EARLIER TIMES

Silverton—Lasting records of unusual achievements characterize the accomplishments of the descendants of two prominent Oregon pioneer families of the year 1846, the heads of which were Dr. Truman Bonney and his brother, Jairus Bonney, whose donation land claims were where the city of Woodburn and the State Training school are now located.

At the Sunday meeting of the group, in their 18th annual reunion, in the Silverton city park, more than 80 were present for the dinner, the program of informal sports contests and the talk by R. J. Hendricks of Salem whose mother, Jane Sherwood, was a granddaughter of Dr. Truman Bonney. Hendricks reviewed the history of the lineage of the family to the English ancestry, telling of one, Doris Sampson, a passenger on the Mayflower becoming the bride of Thomas Bonney who came to America a few years previous on the Hercules. From this union within a few generations came the early Bonneys of the Oregon territory. Hendricks also read from the original copy of the will and testament of Dr. Truman Bonney which provided for the maintenance of his widow by bequeathing the bulk of his property to his son, Bradford, a trust kept to the letter, however, and to each of his daughters he gave \$100 and to another son \$500. Mrs. Merle Hall-Ankeny of Salem has the chest of drawers that was the property of the widow of Dr. Truman Bonney.

The history of the Bonney family was compiled by Dr. Sherman Grant Bonney of Denver, Colo., and is considered a valuable document of many outstanding events in the progress of the west as well as of the earlier history of the nation. Many members of families are prominent in the professional world of letters and medicine.

Informal talks were given by H. C. Bonney of Klamath Falls and C. L. Bonney of Silverton.

The 19th family reunion is planned to be held at Waukena Falls on the Columbia highway about 30 miles from Portland.
