WEDEL FREED ON PAROLE BY COURT
Astoria, Ore., Aug. 13 (UP)—William Wedel, Portland, last of 35 defendants charged with rioting at the Crown-Willamette logging camp near Seaside last March 7, was free on parole today with the rest of his fellow-members of the sawmill and timber workers' union arrested then.

Circuit Judge Peters of Hillsboro, came to town, unannounced last Wednesday, accompanied by Wedel, Deputy Attorney-General Francis Wade and Defense Attorney D. A. Green of Portland, hastily called a deputy county clerk into the court room and sentenced Wedel to two years in state prison. Then he paroled Wedel as was done in the cases of all but one of the other 34 defendants, on recommendation of Wade.

SAUERS REMOVAL SITUATION TENSE
Port Orford, Ore., Aug. 13 (AP)—Interests represented by George Gorman kept a tight grip on the Port Orford Dock and Terminal company property today after Max Sauers, officer of the Port Orford Sea Products company which has claimed to have a lease on the dock was removed from the property yesterday.

The removal was effected by two-acre men from the Trans-Pacific Lumber company a short time after Sauers entered the dock area. Gorman is general manager of the dock which is under the same ownership as the lumber firm. Barricades and armed constables have been guarding the property. Gilbert Cable, formerly in control of the several corporations here, said he granted a lease to the Sea Products firm but that it was returned to him when ownership of the Dock and Terminal corporation was transferred to the interests represented by Gorman.

Blowout of Tire Injures Three Boys
Grants Pass, Aug. 13 (AP)—A tire blowout late yesterday halted a fishing trip, wrecked a truck and injured three Tulelake, Calif., boys.

Thorburn Riebel, 17, was taken to a hospital with fractured ribs and abrasions on the right hand. Don Riebel, 16, had a lip cut which required eight stitches. Gilbert Osborne, 19, suffered a two-inch scalp wound.

The youths were on their way to the mouth of the Klamath river to fish when the tire blew out several miles southwest of here.

fighting it out for the other six Olympic gold medals.

The Hungarians are likely to give the Americans their toughest race. The European champions whipped Italy and Canada decisively, in 6:07.6, and appeared capable of slicing several seconds off that mark.

The Swiss eight, which nosed out Germany by a tenth of a second in 6:08.4 also advanced to the finals.

The United States looked to her boxers and basketball players for other Olympic laurels.

The basketball tournament was in its semi-final round, with the favored United States team drawn against Mexico, and the boxing tournament was in the round of eight, with American boxers in five of the eight divisions.

Berlin, Aug. 13 (AP)—The United States annexed its third consecutive championship of the 11th Olympic Games today, qualified her swimmers in four events without a setback, but uncovered no substitute for Eleanor Holm Jarrett and surrendered the women's 100 meter backstroke crown to Holland.

After Dorothy Popenoe Hill, the 1932 champion, and Velma Dunn of Moovla, Calif., had finished one-two in the women's platform diving championship, Dina Senff, Dutch frau, nosed out her compatriot, Rita Mastenbrook, and the American girls, Alice Bridges of Uxbridge, Mass., and Edith Mottridge Segal of Los Angeles. She thus assumed the women's backstroke title Mrs. Jarrett won for the United States four years ago at Los Angeles.

Mrs. Jarrett, a member of the current Olympic squad, was dismissed from the team for drinking and late hours.

These two finals featured a day of competition marked otherwise by a new world record-breaking performance by Adolf Kiefer, Chicago youngster, in the men's 100 meter backstroke semi-finals and by the successful advance of America's entrants in the women's 400-meter free style trials, the men's 1500-meter free style preliminaries, and the men's 200-meter breast stroke trials.

RILEY INSPIRES LIONS LUNCHEON
Advising his listeners to keep striving no matter how high the obstacles and that success is bound to come to the man who keeps trying, Dr. P. O. Riley in an inspirational address before the Salem Lions club Thursday noon declared the "poorest of us in these United States are better off than the richest in Europe."

There have always been turmoil and dictatorships in Europe, he said, adding that this country should never permit the harboring of communistic ideas either in our educational systems or in government.

Dr. Riley said the greatest thing in the world is life and that we get out of it just what we are willing to put into it.

Next Thursday's luncheon will give way to a picnic which will be held in one of the nearby resorts with families of the Lions as guests.

Portland, Ore., Aug. 13 (UP)—State Republican Assistant Chairman Walter Toose and Secretary Lars Bladine today began organization of a county party program in eastern Oregon to pave the way for a congressional convention at Bend, Aug. 22. GOP leaders here announced.

Other dates are listed as follows: Aug. 14, Hopper and Pendleton; Aug. 15, Enterprise and La Grande; Aug. 17, Baker; Aug. 18, Ontario; Aug. 20, Canyon City and Burns; Aug. 20, Lakeview and Klamath Falls; Aug. 21, Jefferson, Crook and Deschutes county session at Redmond.

All-Time Record for Employment Made
Portland, Aug. 13 (AP)—Employment was given during July to 3,200 men, an all-time record, on Oregon highway projects financed in whole or in part with federal funds, the federal bureau of roads announced.

Approximately 1,300 were employed from the public relief rolls. The bureau expects August employment to be about the same.

An additional 1,600 men were employed on maintenance work during the week, which with the 700 men working for engineering organization brought the total number employed to about 7,500.

Auto Access Easy to Top of Butte Peak
Bend, Ore., Aug. 13 (AP)—Surfacing of the mile-long road to 500-foot Butte Peak gave motorists easy access to the state park at the top of the ancient volcanic cone today. A highway department crew completed the surfacing in four days.

CHINESE-JAPANESE WAR THREATENED

Peiping, China, Aug. 13 (AP)—Armed conflict between China and Japan over a long series of differences was looked upon today in informed circles as not improbable within a short time.

Japan's military activities in North China and Inner Mongolia, which it is believed will be speeded because of a Moscow announcement increasing the size of the Red army, have greatly aggravated the tension between Nanking and Tokyo.

Japanese said efforts to induce China to undertake diplomatic settlement of a score of outstanding issues, had failed.

China, in turn, said this was the result of China's fundamental distrust and fear of Japan which, it alleged, under a guise of economic development was attempting to establish a military hegemony.

JURORS IN HEWITT CASE QUESTIONED
San Francisco, Aug. 13 (UP)—Sterilization under certain circumstances is a boon, not a crime, defense attorneys intimated today as they sought to select a jury to try two prominent doctors charged with sterilizing Ann Cooper Hewitt, heiress to the Peter Cooper Hewitt millions.

"Is sterilization — under certain conditions and circumstances — a crime? Is it not, on the contrary, a boon?" Judge I. M. Golden, attorney for Drs. Tilton E. Tilton and Samuel G. Boyd, asked prospective jurors.

The two physicians are charged with conspiracy to commit mayhem and deprive the 21-year-old heiress of the possibility of motherhood, and resultantly from her share of her inventor father's fortune.

At noon recess a tentative jury of three women and nine men had been selected. The defense indicated it would attempt to obtain an all-male jury and would challenge the prospective women jurors in the afternoon session.

Drought Refugees Present Problem
Portland, Ore., Aug. 13 (AP)—The increasing influx of residents from drought-stricken areas, who were led to believe employment was plentiful in the northwest, presented a new problem to the Portland chamber of commerce today.

R. H. Kipp, manager of the land and development department of the chamber, said "each day many families arrive with only a few dollars and of necessity are forced to apply for relief within a few days."

He commented that "it has become necessary to attempt to get the facts before the middle-western public."

Kipp also said his office has received "heavy inquiry from prospective settlers with means to buy farm lands and become settled before winter."

Advance on Malaga Begun by Franco

Seville, Aug. 13 (UP)—Gen. Francisco Franco, leader of the revolution, began an advance on Malaga today, with three columns converging on the government's most important naval base.

More than 1000 troops from the Gibraltar region moved against Malaga, while two columns from Seville proceeded respectively to Antequera and Ronda for a concentration on Malaga. Severe fighting was expected.

RIP TIDES FATAL TO TWO PERSONS
San Diego, Cal., Aug. 13 (UP)—Heavy rip tides battered the southern California coastline today, bringing death to two persons and resulting in a dramatic crash and sea rescue by two navy seaplanes.

Ensign George Whitaker, U. S. N., was drowned as he was swept out to sea by a rip tide near Coronado. A navy amphibian piloted by Lamo Woodward tried to land beside a man attempting to save Whitaker, but crashed in the high waves. A second navy plane rescued Woodward and the rescuer as well as two other men in a boat who were swamped by high seas trying to reach Whitaker.

Mrs. P. K. Parker of Los Angeles was drowned near Laguna beach yesterday. Scores of rescuers were made by lifeguards.

California Labor Ties up Canneries
Medford, Ore., Aug. 13 (AP)—Employers' demands for 6 cents a box instead of 5 cents resulted in the closing of three fruit packing plants today. Officials of the plants said only California transient workers were involved in the walkout and that companies employing mostly local labor were not affected. About 250 persons lost their jobs as a result of the strike.

Range Men Would Benefit by AAA Plan
Pendleton, Aug. 13 (AP)—Any AAA program for the range livestockmen of the west will be designed to strengthen rather than diminish or shift the industry.

This definite assurance was given here today by Dr. D. McMunniford, assistant to George E. Farrell, western regional director of the AAA, in the opening discussion held with cattle and sheep men of eastern Oregon who crowded the Umatilla county court room to hear proposals for bringing their industry under the benefits of the new agricultural conservation program.

Deputy Assessors On South Santiam
Albany, Ore., Aug. 13 (AP)—Five deputy county assessors, acting for federal engineers, surveyed the South Santiam, Calapooia and Willamette river basins in Linn county today to gather data relative to the nature and values of land to be affected by flood control programs.

Several precinct committeemen announced that their quotas had already been subscribed.

Claude McCulloch, newly elected chairman of the state central committee, was the principal speaker, outlining campaign plans for the coming contest and suggesting various organization methods.

Rooster Faces Pot For Too Much Noise
Portland, Ore., Aug. 13 (AP)—A neighborhood controversy apparently neared an end today, with a rooster to be deprived of his life and a neighbor to be deprived of the rooster.

The case arose when the neighbor complained the rooster was noisy. After investigating, Patrolman Roberts reported the rooster's owners "decided they would put him (the rooster) in the pot. She also asked me to tell the man who reported it that he would not be invited to participate."

Recruiting Barred For Spanish Armies
Paris, Aug. 13 (AP)—The government today barred recruiting in France for Spanish armies as the Quai d'Orsay renewed its drive for a general European neutrality accord.

The dictum followed directly consideration of questions propounded by Premier Mussolini of Italy on the proposed non-intervention agreement.

Mussolini specifically had brought up the question of recruiting and the collection of funds to help either side in the Spanish rebellion.

Cooler Weather Damper on Fires
Spokane, Wash., Aug. 13 (UP)—Cooler weather today had served as a damper on forest fires of the Idaho and eastern Washington forests. The forest service reports.

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IRON HAND FOR SPAIN APPEARS TO BE CERTAIN

torship has not been made clear, but many of the insurgents are fascists. In either event, democracy is off the cards.

What is going on in Spain is another striking example of the violent swings either to left or right which have marked most governmental changes since the World war.

Here are socialists, communists and similar elements—popularly described as "the left"—in conflict with interests representing the other extreme, the so-called conservatives or "the right," who include capital and aristocracy.

The middle parties, the moderates, have been swallowed up. This same thing has happened in most of the upheavals in other countries. There has been no half-way mark.

The trend in revolutions throughout the world since the great war has been away from rule by the people. Democracy as America knows it has had a hard knock. In its place has risen fascism, or some form of it, and communism or extreme socialism.

Fascism, originated by Mussolini in 1919, is the antithesis of democracy. It calls for a totalitarian rule, that is, one in which only one political party is permitted to exist, and in which the individual is subordinated to the good of the state.

A dictatorship is essential, and the dictator decides what is for the good of the state.

Communism in theory calls for rule by the proletariat, or masses, for the good of the masses. However, it also holds that successful governmental change can be effected only by revolution and the reconstruction of society, and it provides for dictatorship at the outset.

This far communism has not progressed much beyond the point of fierce dictatorship, so that in effect in communist countries there is totalitarian rule differing little from fascism as far as democracy is concerned.

Russia presented the first notable swing to the left. The communistic revolution spread until today the numerous countries in the soviet union comprise about one-seventh of the earth's area.

Outside this domain the reds have been thrusting vigorously and persistently into Spain, France, China, Mexico and many parts of South America. There are few spots on the globe which have not received the party's attention.

Both fascism and nazism were in part the outgrowth of the rapid spread of communism and extreme socialism.

One of the first items on the programs of both Mussolini and Hitler called for the absolute elimination of communists and other extremists. Ostensibly, both these colorful and all-powerful dictators succeeded in this aim.

Fascist Italy and Nazi Germany are the outstanding examples of the totalitarian state with its absolute dictatorship. Mussolini and Hitler, both of whom were pioneers in the creation of new social structures, and the most widely known of the dictators.

While nazism has been confined largely to Germany and Austria, to Mussolini falls the credit of having started a world movement.

Among the new fascist states are Lithuania, under the dictatorship of President Antanas Smetona; Estonia, governed by President Konstantin Paets; and Paraguay—one of the latest—under its president, Colonel Rafael Franco.

There are other dictatorships, however, which have not been labeled with any political tag.

Among them are Turkey, long under the absolute rule of the famous Kamal Ataturk; Austria, whose dictatorial leader is Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg; Poland, in the hands of General Edward Rydz Smigly, on whose shoulders fell the mantle of the late Marshal Joseph Pilsudski; Latvia, whose dictator is Prime Minister Karl Ulmanis; Bolivia, under President Colonel David Toro; and Greece, which only a few days ago came under the dictatorship of General John Metaxas, the premier, who announced he was acting with the approval of King George.

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Annual Tour Ends For Nut Producers

Newberg, Ore., Aug. 13 (AP)—A chamber of commerce luncheon closed an annual tour of 11 ranches today for nearly 80 carloads of western Oregon nut growers. The walnut and filbert orchards were surveyed as a first-hand study of methods to improve yields and combat threats to good crops.
