

# NEW ESTACADA SCHOOL ONE OF STATE'S FINEST

Aurora—The new \$145,000 Estacada union high school building, designed by P. Martin Stokes, Portland, architect, is now nearing completion and is one of the most modern schools in the Willamette valley.

The high school building, located on Main street just north of the new grade school, is being constructed by Allyn & Powers of Portland. The building is of brick construction, is 385 feet long and is constructed in three units. The center unit houses classrooms, cafeteria, domestic arts, drafting room, band room, library and offices. The hall is 15 feet wide and lockers are installed in the halls.

The left wing of the building is the auditorium with bowl floor, balcony and a large stage. The auditorium seating about 1000 people. Beneath the stage are the dressing rooms.

The right wing contains the gymnasium and manual training shop, creasing rooms and showers for boys and girls, and offices for the physical instructor.

The heating plant is located in the rear and center of the building.

The school is planned for three units in order that the balance of the building may be closed and additions added later. There are five entrances in the front of the school, three leading to classrooms in the center and one at each end unit.

The Estacada union high school district was formed in 1931 and at present five modern buses are used to transport students from Barton, Eagle Creek, Currinville, Dodge, Elwood, George, Garfield, Porter, Douglas Ridge, Springvale, Viola and pupils from Three Links where no transportation is available are boarded in Estacada. Non-high school pupils come from North Logan.

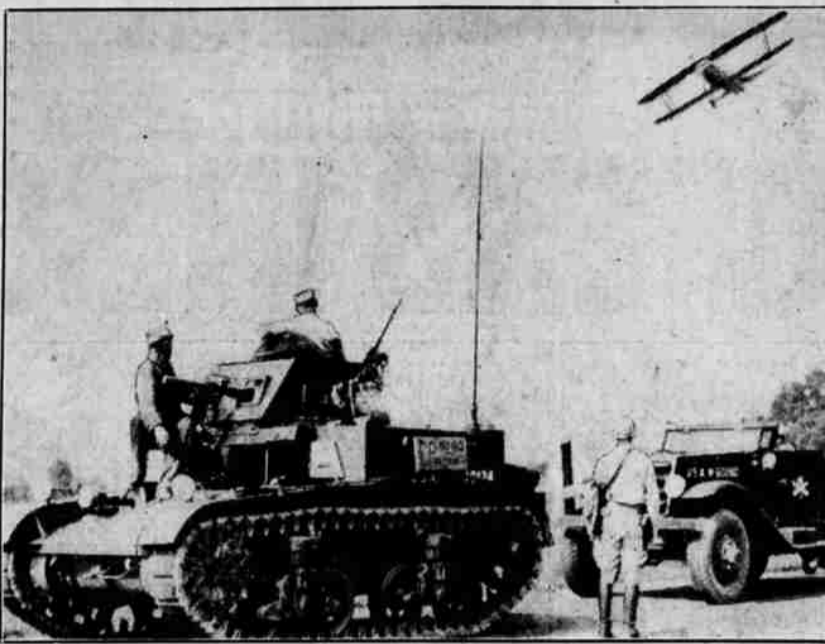

## \$90,000 BRIDGE THING OF BEAUTY

Aurora—The new \$90,000 steel and concrete bridge over the Clackamas river at Estacada, constructed by the Mountain States Construction company, is practically completed. It is one of the most beautiful bridges in this part of the state, and is a credit to the builders.  
The arch span across the river which is 84-feet above the water, measures 145 feet from bank to bank. There are two large piers erected, one on each side of the river. On the South Estacada side of the river two supporting piers of the river two supporting piers for the approaches are put in and on the Estacada side there are five piers for the approaches. Approximately 105 tons of reinforcing steel and 1560 tons of concrete were used in the construction of the bridge. More than 70 men were employed in its construction.  
New road approaches to the bridge have also been constructed on both sides of the river.
